



### **AGENCY RECOMMENDATION**

The Agency states that it received a tax certification application from WRB on or about October 14, 2010.<sup>1</sup> Rec. at ¶ 1. On December 6, 2013, the Agency filed a recommendation on the application with the Board, attaching WRB's application (Rec. Exh. A).<sup>2</sup> The Agency's recommendation identifies the facilities at issue:

The subject matter of this request involves the construction and installation of Ultralow [NO<sub>x</sub>] Burners to Heaters H-4 and H-5 of the Catalytic Reformer No. 3, which was undertaken by the refinery to reduce NO<sub>x</sub> emissions in accordance with a consent decree previously entered between Conoco Phillips and the United States Environmental Protection Agency. As described in the application, the existing burners, which possess smaller flow passages for fuel gas and are lower in cost, were replaced with newer burners that will reduce NO<sub>x</sub> emissions. The new burners assure "[ ] lower NO<sub>x</sub> formation by burning the fuel gas with a lower flame temperature," which is achieved "by staging the fuel into the burner and by inducing a flow of flue gas back into the burner." In addition, the project included the installation of additional filtering and conditioning of fuel gas to ensure that the solid materials do not interfere with the burner ports, as well as modifications to the convection parts of the heaters themselves. Rec. at ¶ 4 (quoting Rec. Exh. A; citations omitted).

The Agency further describes the facilities: "The application states that the NO<sub>x</sub> reduction project will reduce NO<sub>x</sub> emissions from the two heaters by an estimated three hundred twenty five (325) tons per year, and the project therefore prevents or reduces air pollution that would otherwise be emitted to the atmosphere." Rec. at ¶ 5.

The Agency recommends that the Board certify that the Ultralow NO<sub>x</sub> Burners for Heaters H-4 and H-5 of Catalytic Reformer No. 3 are pollution control facilities as defined in Section 11-10 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/11-10 (2012)) with the primary purpose "to prevent or reduce air pollution." Rec. at ¶¶ 7, 8; *see also* Rec. Exh. B (Agency technical memorandum).

### **TAX CERTIFICATE**

Based upon the Agency's recommendation and WRB's applications, the Board finds and certifies that WRB's Ultralow NO<sub>x</sub> Burners identified in this order are pollution control facilities under the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/11-10 (2012)). The Board makes no finding regarding the assessed value of those facilities. Under Section 11-25 of the Property Tax Code, the effective date of this certificate is "the date of application for the certificate or the date of the construction of the facility, which ever is later." 35 ILCS 200/11-25 (2012); *see also* 35 Ill. Adm. Code 125.216(a). Section 125.216(d) of the Board's procedural rules states that the Clerk

“will provide the applicant and the Agency with a copy of the Board’s order setting forth *the Board’s findings and certificate, if any.*” 35 Ill. Adm. Code 125.216(d) (quoting in italics 35 ILCS 200/11-30 (2012)). The Clerk therefore will provide WRB and the Agency with a copy of this order.

IT IS SO ORDERED.

Section 11-60 of the Property Tax Code provides that any applicant or holder aggrieved by the issuance, refusal to issue, denial, revocation, modification or restriction of a pollution control certificate or a low sulfur dioxide emission coal fueled device certificate may appeal the Board’s finding and order to the Circuit Court under the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 *et seq.* (2012)). *See* 35 ILCS 200/11-60 (2012).
