First Hearing on Rule Making to Govern Coal Ash Pollution Prevention Act

- b) When a plant closes, coal ash cannot be closed in place if it will get wet.
- c) Ash in ground water must be cleaned up completely. The job is not finished until all ash is removed however long that takes.
- d) No coal ash contaminated in background wells.
- e) Rules should regulate ash dumps and fill.
- f) Protect workers and communities, especially environmental justice and other local communities, from dust during all aspects of cleanup, transport, and site demolition.
- g) Illinois rules must not be rolled back even if federal rules are rolled back. Keep them as strict as possible.
- h) Constant ground water monitoring required with no time limits on a pond closed in place.
- i) Provide for public comment at all stages of the rule making.
