NOW COMES Complainant, PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, by LISA MADIGAN, Attorney General of the State of Illinois, and pursuant to Section 31(c)(2) of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act ("Act"), 415 ILCS 5/31(c)(2) (2010), moves that the Illinois Pollution Control Board grant the parties in the above-captioned matter relief from the hearing requirement imposed by Section 31(c)(1) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/31(c)(1) (2010). In support of this motion, Complainant states as follows:

1. On April 3, 2013, a Complaint and Stipulation and Proposal for Settlement are being filed simultaneously with the Illinois Pollution Control Board ("Board") in this matter.
2. The parties have reached agreement on all outstanding issues in this matter.
3. This agreement is presented to the Board in a Stipulation and Proposal for Settlement, filed contemporaneously with this motion.
4. All parties agree that a hearing on the Stipulation and Proposal for Settlement is not necessary, and respectfully request relief from such a hearing as allowed by Section 31(c)(2) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/31(c)(2) (2010).

WHEREFORE, Complainant, PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, hereby requests that the Board grant this motion for relief from the hearing requirement set forth in Section 31(c)(1) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/31(c)(1) (2010).

COMPLAINT

Complainant, PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, by LISA MADIGAN, Attorney General of the State of Illinois, complains of Respondent, OIL TECHNOLOGY, INC., as follows:

COUNT I
PERMIT CONDITION VIOLATIONS

1. This Complaint is brought by the Attorney General on her own motion and at the request of the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency ("Illinois EPA"), pursuant to the terms and provisions of Section 31 of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act ("Act"), 415 ILCS 5/31(2010).
2. The Illinois EPA is an agency of the State of Illinois created by the Illinois General Assembly in Section 4 of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/4(2010), and charged, *inter alia*, with the duty of enforcing the Act in proceedings before the Illinois Pollution Control Board ("Board").
3. This Complaint is brought pursuant to Section 31 of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/31(2010), after providing the Respondent with notice and the opportunity for a meeting with the Illinois EPA.

4. Respondent, Oil Technology, Inc., ("Oil Technology") is an Indiana corporation. Oil Technology's registered agent and principal is Gerald L. Piper, located at 1203 Sheffield Avenue Dyer, Indiana 46311.

5. Oil Technology operates U.S. Steel's Granite City facility located at Route 203, Granite City, Madison County, Illinois ("Facility" or "Source").

6. At all times relevant to this complaint, Oil Technology's primary business at the Facility was recycling used oil.

7. On September 3, 2009, Illinois EPA issued Oil Technology a Clean Air Act Permit Program ("CAAPP"), CAAPP Permit No. 01080007.

8. At all times relevant to this Complaint, the emissions unit at the Facility is the tank for processing used oil.

9. Oil Technology's operation of the Source is subject to the Act and the Illinois Pollution Control Board ("Board") and Illinois EPA rules and regulations for air pollution, which are found in Title 35, Subtitle B, of the Illinois Administrative Code ("Air Pollution Regulations").

10. Section 39.5(6)(a) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/39.5(6)(a)(2010), provides:

Prohibitions.

- a. It shall be unlawful for any person to violate any terms or conditions of a permit issued under this Section, to operate any CAAPP source except in compliance with a permit issued by the Agency under this Section or to violate any other applicable requirements. All terms and conditions of a permit issued under this Section are enforceable by USEPA and citizens under the Clean Air Act, except those, if any, that are specifically designated as not being federally enforceable in the permit pursuant to paragraph 7(m) of this Section.

11. Section 3.315 of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/3.315(2010), provides the following definition:

"Person" is any individual, partnership, co-partnership, firm, company, limited liability company, corporation, association, joint stock company, trust, estate, political subdivision, state agency, or any other legal entity, or their legal representative, agent or assigns.

12. Oil Technology, a corporation, is a "person," as that term is defined in Section 3.315 of the Act, 415 5/3.315(2010).

13. Section 39.5(1) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/39.5(1)(2010), provides the following definitions:

"CAAPP" means the Clean Air Act Permit Program, developed pursuant to Title V of the Clean Air Act.

"CAAPP Permit" . . . means any permit issued, renewed, amended, modified or revised pursuant to Title V of the Clean Air Act.

"CAAPP source" means any source for which the owner or operator is required to obtain a CAAPP permit pursuant to subsection 2 of this Section.

"Owner or operator" means any person who owns, leases, operates, controls, or supervises a stationary source.

14. At all times relevant to this Complaint, Oil Technology has been an "owner or operator" of a "CAAPP source", as those terms are defined in Section 39.5(1) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/39.5(1)(2010).

15. Oil Technology's CAAPP Permit No. 01080007 includes Condition 9.8, which states in part:

Pursuant to Section 39.5(7)(p)(v) of the Act, the Permittee shall submit annual compliance certifications. The compliance certifications shall be submitted no later than May 1 or more frequently as specified in the applicable requirements or by permit conditions.

16. Pursuant to CAAPP Permit No. 01080007, Oil Technology was required to submit its annual compliance certification no later than May 1 of each year.

17. On February 18, 2009, the Illinois EPA issued a violation notice ("VN"), VN A-2009-00018, to Oil Technology alleging it failed to submit an annual compliance certification for the 2007 calendar year. On or before March 26, 2009, Oil Technology submitted an annual compliance certification for the 2007 calendar year.

18. On October 24, 2011, the Illinois EPA issued VN A-2011-00183, to Oil Technology alleging it failed to submit an annual compliance certification for the 2009 and 2010 calendar year. On or before January 24, 2012, Oil Technology submitted an annual compliance certification for the 2009 and 2010 calendar year.

19. For the 2011 calendar year, Oil Technology was required to submit its annual compliance certification no later than May 1, 2012, pursuant to CAAPP Permit No. 01080007.

20. On September 21, 2012, the Illinois EPA issued Violation Notice ("VN") A-2012-00147 to Oil Technology alleging it failed to submit an annual compliance certification for calendar year 2011. On September 28, 2012, Oil Technology submitted a proposed Compliance Commitment Agreement ("CCA") to the Illinois EPA. The CCA was rejected by the Illinois EPA by letter dated October 18, 2012.

21. On September 28, 2012, Oil Technology submitted an annual compliance certification for the 2011 calendar year.

22. A Notice of Intent to Pursue Legal Action was issued to Oil Technology on October 24, 2012. A meeting pursuant to Section 31 of the Act occurred on November 5, 2012 with representatives of the Illinois EPA and Oil Technology.

23. Since Oil Technology's annual compliance certification was not filed by the prescribed May 1st permit deadline, the compliance certification was not timely.

24. Oil Technology did not timely submit its annual compliance certification for the 2011 calendar year.

25. By failing to submit the annual compliance certification for the 2011 calendar year in a timely manner, Oil Technology has violated Section 39.5(6)(a) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/39.5(6)(a)(2010) and Condition 9.8 of CAAPP Permit No. 01080007.

PRAYER FOR RELIEF


WHEREFORE, Complainant, the PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, respectfully request that the Board enter an order against the Respondent, OIL TECHNOLOGY, INC.:

- A. Authorizing a hearing in this matter at which time the Respondent will be required to answer the allegations herein;
- B. Finding that Respondent has violated the Act as alleged herein;
- C. Ordering Respondent to cease and desist from any further violations of the Act;
- D. Assessing against Respondent a civil penalty of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for each violation of the Act, and an additional penalty of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for each day during which each violation has continued thereafter;
- E. Awarding to Complainant its costs and reasonable attorney's fees; and
- F. Granting such other relief as the Board may deem appropriate.

STIPULATION AND PROPOSAL FOR SETTLEMENT

Complainant, PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, by LISA MADIGAN, Attorney General of the State of Illinois, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency ("Illinois EPA"), and Oil Technology, Inc., ("Respondent") ("Parties to the Stipulation"), have agreed to the making of this Stipulation and Proposal for Settlement ("Stipulation") and submit it to the Illinois Pollution Control Board ("Board") for approval. This stipulation of facts is made and agreed upon for purposes of settlement only and as a factual basis for the Board's approval of this Stipulation and issuance of relief. None of the facts stipulated herein shall be introduced into evidence in any other proceeding regarding the violations of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act ("Act"), 415 ILCS 5/1 *et seq.* (2010), and the Board's Regulations, alleged in the Complaint except as otherwise provided herein. It is the intent of the Parties to the Stipulation that it be a final adjudication of this matter.

I. STATEMENT OF FACTS

A. Parties

1. A Complaint was filed simultaneous with this Stipulation and Proposal for

Settlement on behalf of the People of the State of Illinois by Lisa Madigan, Attorney General of the State of Illinois, on her own motion and upon the request of the Illinois EPA, pursuant to Section 31 of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/31 (2010), against the Respondent.

2. The Illinois EPA is an administrative agency of the State of Illinois, created pursuant to Section 4 of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/4 (2010).

3. At all times relevant to the Complaint, Respondent was and is an Indiana corporation. At all times relevant to the Complaint, Respondent owned and operated a business recycling used oil at the U.S. Steel's Granite City facility located at Route 203, Granite City, Madison County, Illinois ("site").

4. On September 3, 2009, Illinois EPA issued Respondent a Clean Air Act Permit Program ("CAAPP"), CAAPP Permit No. 01080007.

5. For the 2011 calendar year, Respondent was required to submit its annual compliance certification no later than May 1, 2012, pursuant to CAAPP Permit No. 01080007.

6. On September 28, 2012, Respondent submitted an annual compliance certification for the 2011 calendar year.

B. Allegations of Non-Compliance

Complainant contends that the Respondent has violated the following provisions of the Act and Board regulations:

Count I: Permit Condition Violations

Respondent failed to submit the annual compliance certification for the 2011 calendar year in a timely manner, in violation of Section 39.5(6)(a) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/39.5(6)(a)(2010) and Condition 9.8 of CAAPP Permit No. 01080007.

C. Admission of Violations

The Respondent admits to the violation alleged in the Complaint filed in this matter and referenced within Section I.B herein.

D. Compliance Activities to Date

On September 28, 2012, Respondent submitted an annual compliance certification for the 2011 calendar year.

II. APPLICABILITY

This Stipulation shall apply to and be binding upon the Parties to the Stipulation. The Respondent shall not raise as a defense to any enforcement action taken pursuant to this Stipulation the failure of any of its officers, directors, agents, employees or successors or assigns to take such action as shall be required to comply with the provisions of this Stipulation. This Stipulation may be used against the Respondent in any subsequent enforcement action or permit proceeding as proof of a past adjudication of violation of the Act and the Board Regulations for all violations alleged in the Complaint in this matter, for purposes of Sections 39 and 42 of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/39 and 42 (2010).

III. IMPACT ON THE PUBLIC RESULTING FROM ALLEGED NON-COMPLIANCE

Section 33(c) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/33(c)(2010), provides as follows:

In making its orders and determinations, the Board shall take into consideration all the facts and circumstances bearing upon the reasonableness of the emissions, discharges, or deposits involved including, but not limited to:

1. the character and degree of injury to, or interference with the protection of the health, general welfare and physical property of the people;
2. the social and economic value of the pollution source;
3. the suitability or unsuitability of the pollution source to the area in which it is located, including the question of priority of location in the area

involved;

4. the technical practicability and economic reasonableness of reducing or eliminating the emissions, discharges or deposits resulting from such pollution source; and
5. any subsequent compliance.

In response to these factors, the Parties to the Stipulation state the following:

1. The failure by Respondent to timely submit the annual compliance certification impeded the Illinois EPA's recordkeeping requirements to ensure and enforce compliance with applicable federal and state environmental laws and regulations.
2. There is social and economic benefit to the facility resulting from the recycling operations performed by Respondent at the facility.
3. Issues with regard to siting and priority of location are not the subject of the enforcement case, nor were public comments and concerns relative to Respondent's operations received by Complainant documenting Respondent's facility is unsuitable to the area in which it is located.
4. Submitting an annual compliance certification and compliance with the CAAPP permit terms is both technically practicable and economically reasonable.
5. Respondent has subsequently complied with the Act and the Board Regulations.

IV. CONSIDERATION OF SECTION 42(h) FACTORS

Section 42(h) of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/42(h)(2012), provides as follows:

In determining the appropriate civil penalty to be imposed under . . . this Section, the Board is authorized to consider any matters of record in mitigation or aggravation of penalty, including but not limited to the following factors:

1. the duration and gravity of the violation;
2. the presence or absence of due diligence on the part of the respondent in attempting to comply with requirements of this Act and regulations thereunder or to secure relief therefrom as provided by this Act;
3. any economic benefits accrued by the respondent because of delay in compliance with requirements, in which case the economic benefits shall be determined by the lowest cost alternative for achieving compliance;

4. the amount of monetary penalty which will serve to deter further violations by the respondent and to otherwise aid in enhancing voluntary compliance with this Act by the respondent and other persons similarly subject to the Act;
5. the number, proximity in time, and gravity of previously adjudicated violations of this Act by the respondent;
6. whether the respondent voluntarily self-disclosed, in accordance with subsection i of this Section, the non-compliance to the Agency;
7. whether the respondent has agreed to undertake a "supplemental environmental project," which means an environmentally beneficial project that a respondent agrees to undertake in settlement of an enforcement action brought under this Act, but which the respondent is not otherwise legally required to perform; and
8. whether the respondent has successfully completed a Compliance Commitment Agreement under subsection (a) of Section 31 of this Act to remedy the violations that are the subject of the complaint.

In response to these factors, the Parties to the Stipulation state as follows:

1. The Respondent failed to timely submit the annual compliance certification which by the conditions of its CAAPP permit was due on May 1, 2012. The violation began on or around May 1, 2012 and continued until September 28, 2012.
2. Respondent was diligent in attempting to come back into compliance with the Act, Board regulations and applicable federal regulations, once the Illinois EPA notified it of its noncompliance.
3. Any economic benefit attributable to the noncompliance would be minimal.
4. Complainant has determined, based upon the specific facts of this matter that a penalty of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) will serve to deter further violations and aid in future voluntary compliance with the Act and Board regulations.

5. To Complainant's knowledge, Respondent has no previously adjudicated violations of the Act.

6. Self-disclosure is not at issue in this matter.

7. The settlement of this matter includes a supplemental environmental project. Respondent will provide Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500.00) to the Illinois Clean Diesel Grant Program which is administered by the Illinois Green Fleets Program to purchase a direct-fired heater for a school bus engine. The Illinois Green Fleets Program will provide the direct-fired heater to a school district owned school bus within the Illinois counties of Bond, Calhoun, Clinton, Jersey, Madison or Randolph.

8. On September 28, 2012, Oil Technology submitted a proposed Compliance Commitment Agreement ("CCA") to the Illinois EPA. The CCA was rejected by the Illinois EPA by letter dated October 18, 2012.

V. TERMS OF SETTLEMENT

A. Penalty Payment

1. The Respondent shall pay a civil penalty in the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) within thirty (30) days from the date the Board adopts and accepts this Stipulation.

B. Payment Procedures

All payments required by this Stipulation shall be made by certified check or money order payable to the Illinois EPA for deposit into the Environmental Protection Trust Fund ("EPTF"). Payments shall be sent by first class mail and delivered to:

C. Future Compliance

1. Respondent shall submit its annual compliance certification by the May 1 deadline pursuant to Condition 9.8 of CAAPP Permit No. 01080007.

2. In addition to any other authorities, the Illinois EPA, its employees and representatives, and the Attorney General, her employees and representatives, shall have the right of entry into and upon the Respondent's facility which is the subject of this Stipulation, at all reasonable times for the purposes of conducting inspections and evaluating compliance status. In conducting such inspections, the Illinois EPA, its employees and representatives, and the Attorney General, her employees and representatives, may take photographs, samples, and collect information, as they deem necessary.

3. This Stipulation in no way affects the responsibilities of the Respondent to comply with any other federal, state or local laws or regulations, including but not limited to the Act and the Board Regulations.

4. The Respondent shall cease and desist from future violations of the Act and Board Regulations that were the subject matter of the Complaint.

D. Supplemental Environmental Project

1. In order to promote the goals of the Act to restore, protect and enhance the quality of the environment, the Respondent shall perform the following supplemental environmental project ("SEP"). The settlement value of the SEP is Four Thousand and Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500.00) and will offset penalties sought by the Complainant and the Illinois EPA in this matter. The Parties to the Stipulation agree that this SEP shall consist of the following:

Payment to the Illinois EPA Special State Projects Fund for the Illinois Clean Diesel Grant Program which is administered by the Illinois Green Fleets Program shall be used to purchase a direct-fired heater for a school bus engine owed by a school district within the Illinois counties of Bond, Calhoun, Clinton, Jersey, Madison or Randolph.

2. The Respondent shall complete the SEP no later than May 1, 2013 and, within 30 days thereafter, shall submit a project completion report, including a summary of all expenditures, to the contact persons identified in Section V.F for review and confirmation that the SEP was performed pursuant to this Stipulation. The project completion report shall include the following certification by a responsible corporate official of the Respondent:

I certify under penalty of law that this document was prepared under my direction or supervision in accordance with a system designed to assure that qualified personnel properly gather and evaluate the information submitted based on my inquiry of those persons directly responsible for gathering the information, and that the information submitted in or accompanying this notification of final compliance is to the best of my knowledge true, accurate and complete. I am aware that there are significant penalties for submitting false information, including the possibility of fine and or imprisonment for knowing violations.

In the event that the SEP cannot be completed, the Respondent shall pay the settlement value of the SEP (\$4,500.00) as an additional penalty pursuant to the procedures of Section V.B no later than the date by which the SEP should have been completed.

3. By signature on this Stipulation, the Respondent certifies that, as of the date of entry of this Order, it is not required to perform or develop the foregoing SEP by any federal, state or local law or regulation, nor is it required to perform or develop the SEP by agreement or injunctive relief in any other case. The Respondent further certifies that it has not received, and is not presently negotiating to receive credit for, the SEPs in any other enforcement action.

4. Any public statement, oral or written, in print, film or other media, made by the Respondent making reference to any SEP shall include the following language: "This project was undertaken in connection with the settlement of an enforcement action taken by the Illinois Attorney General and the Illinois EPA for alleged violations of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act and regulations promulgated thereunder."

E. Release from Liability

In consideration of the Respondent's payment of the \$3,000.00 penalty, its commitment to cease and desist as contained in Section V.C. above, its performance of the SEP as contained in Section V.D. above completion of all activities required hereunder, and upon the Board's approval of this Stipulation, the Complainant releases, waives and discharges the Respondent from any further liability or penalties for the violations of the Act and Board Regulations that were the subject matter of the Complaint herein. The release set forth above does not extend to any matters other than those expressly specified in Complainant's Complaint filed simultaneous with this Stipulation. The Complainant reserves, and this Stipulation is without prejudice to, all rights of the State of Illinois against the Respondent with respect to all other matters, including but not limited to, the following:

- a. criminal liability;

- b. liability for future violation of state, federal, local, and common laws and/or regulations;
- c. liability for natural resources damage arising out of the alleged violations; and
- d. liability or claims based on the Respondent's failure to satisfy the requirements of this Stipulation.

Nothing in this Stipulation is intended as a waiver, discharge, release, or covenant not to sue for any claim or cause of action, administrative or judicial, civil or criminal, past or future, in law or in equity, which the State of Illinois may have against any person, as defined by Section 3.315 of the Act, 415 ILCS 5/3.315, or entity other than the Respondent.


