Adopted Emergency Rule. Final Order.

OPINION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD (by B.F. Currie):

On April 10, 2020, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) filed an emergency rulemaking proposal with the Board. The emergency rule will extend the renewal period for cross connection control device inspectors (CCCDI). Under the general rule the renewal period is May 1, 2020 until June 30, 2020. 35 Ill. Adm. Code 604.1510. The emergency rule changes that period to August 31 to October 30. Prop. 35 Ill. Adm. Code 604.1520.

Governor J.B. Pritzker declared a state of emergency on March 9, 2020, and renewed that declaration on April 1, 2020. Because of the current state of emergency due to the pandemic caused by COVID 19, the Board agrees that an emergency exists and adopts the emergency rule.

Below the Board will summarize IEPA's proposal, delineate the statutory authority for emergency rulemaking, and finally explain why the Board agrees with IEPA's request.

### IEPA PROPOSAL

IEPA explains that CCCDI are required to be licensed plumbers and are authorized to perform plumbing as described in the Illinois Plumbing License Law (225 ILCS 320/3(1)). 35 Ill. Adm. Code 604.1510(b)(1)(a). A CCCDI is approved by IEPA or its designee as being capable of performing the inspection of mechanical devices that prevent contamination of a community water supply from a source of an unsafe substance or of unknown water quality. SR. at 3. Manufacturing instructions of these devices require annual inspection. SR at 3-4.

The general rule requires:

CCCDIs must-renew the CCCDI Approval each year between May 1 and June 30. An application for CCCDI renewal will be sent by the Agency or its designee, and must be completed and returned by June 30 of the renewal year. 35 Ill. Adm. Code 604.1510(b)(2).

IEPA proposes to add as an emergency rule a new Section 1510.620 that provides:

Due to the public health emergency related to the COVID-19 outbreak, the CCCDI approval renewal application deadlines for 2020 pursuant to Section 604.1510(b)(2) are extended. For renewal year 2020, CCCDIs must-renew their CCCDI Approval between August 31 and October 30. An application for CCCDI renewal will be sent by the Agency or its designee and must be completed and returned by October 30, 2020. Prop. Section 1510.620.

IEPA notes that on March 31, 2020, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) published emergency rules extending the deadline for plumbers' license renewals, apprentice plumbers' license renewal, and plumbing inspectors' certificate renewals 120 days to August 28, 2020. SR at 3. IEPA explains that because CCCDIs must be licensed plumbers, IEPA proposes to extend the approval period for CCCDI for 120 days, consistent with the IDPH emergency rule. SR at 1.

#### **STATUTORY AND REGULATORY BACKGROUND**

When adopting emergency rules, the Board must follow the dictates of both the Environmental Protection Act (Act), 415 ILCS 5 *et seq.* (2018) and the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act (IAPA), 5 ILCS 5/100 *et seq.* (2018).

Section 27 (a) and (c) of the Act provides in part:

The Board may adopt substantive regulations as described in this Act. \*\*\* In promulgating regulations under this Act, the Board shall take into account the existing physical conditions, the character of the area involved, including the character of surrounding land uses, zoning classifications, the nature of the existing air quality, or receiving body of water, as the case may be, and the technical feasibility and economic reasonableness of measuring or reducing the particular type of pollution.

On proclamation by the Governor, pursuant to Section 8 of the Illinois Emergency Services and Disaster Act of 1975, that a disaster emergency exists, or when the Board finds that a severe public health emergency exists, the Board may, in relation to any proposed regulation, order that such regulation shall take effect without delay and the Board shall proceed with the hearings and studies required by this Section while the regulation continues in effect.

When the Board finds that a situation exists that reasonably constitutes a threat to the public interest, safety or welfare, the Board may adopt regulations pursuant to and in accordance with Section 5-45 of the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act. 415 ILCS 5/27(a) and (c) (2018).

Section 5-45 of the IAPA provides in part:

(a) "Emergency" means the existence of any situation that any agency finds reasonably constitutes a threat to the public interest, safety, or welfare.

- (b) If any agency finds that an emergency exists that requires adoption of a rule upon fewer days than is required by Section 5-40 and states in writing its reasons for that finding, the agency may adopt an emergency rule without prior notice or hearing upon filing a notice of emergency rulemaking with the Secretary of State under Section 5-70. The notice shall include the text of the emergency rule and shall be published in the Illinois Register. Consent orders or other court orders adopting settlements negotiated by an agency may be adopted under this Section. Subject to applicable constitutional or statutory provisions, an emergency rule becomes effective immediately upon filing under Section 5-65 or at a stated date less than 10 days thereafter. The agency's finding and a statement of the specific reasons for the finding shall be filed with the rule. The agency shall take reasonable and appropriate measures to make emergency rules known to the persons who may be affected by them.
- (c) An emergency rule may be effective for a period of not longer than 150 days, but the agency's authority to adopt an identical rule under Section 5-40 is not precluded.

\* \* \*

The IAPA goes on to provide that, after filing, emergency rules will be reviewed by the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (JCAR). Under Section 100/5-120, JCAR examines an emergency rule "to determine whether the rule is within the statutory authority on which it is based and whether the rule is in proper form." 5 ILCS 100/5-120(a) (2018). If JCAR determines a rule is non-compliant, JCAR may file an objection, to which the adopting agency can respond. If JCAR is not satisfied with the response, it can take various actions, including suspension of the rule. 5 ILCS 100/5-120 and 125 (2018).

#### **DISCUSSION**

Governor JB Pritzker declared an emergency in Illinois on March 8, 2020, and extended the emergency declaration on April 1, 2020. IEPA notes that State agencies are temporarily reducing activities and workforce to core mission functions and essential operations. SR at 3. IEPA further notes that agencies are encouraged to work remotely where possible. IEPA argues that the Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamations gives the Board a mandate to ensure the effects of COVID-19 are mitigated and minimized. SR at 7.

IEPA argues that extending the renewal deadline for CCCDI, along with their plumbing licenses renewal requirements, will reduce the possibility of job loss during this pandemic. IEPA explains that those persons submitting a renewal application will first need adequate time to obtain a plumbing license renewal. If they cannot do so, there could be a gap where a CCCDI would lose CCCDI approval because they had not been able to renew their plumber's licenses. *Id.* IEPA notes that over 2,500 CCCDI approvals have not yet been renewed. SR at 9.

For all these reasons, IEPA argues that an emergency exists and the Board's authority allows the Board to adopt the emergency rules. The Board agrees. CCCDIs play a significant role in protecting public health and welfare by helping to ensure that public water supplies are protected from connections to and contaminations by unsafe sources of water. Among other requirements that apply to their position, CCCDIs must be plumbers licensed by IPDH. In response to the Governor's emergency declaration, which has a dramatic effect on the operations of state government, IDPH extended the deadline to renew plumbers' licenses to October 30, 2020. Under the general rule, CCCDI approvals expire on June 30, 2020. As a result of IDPH's extension, it is not now possible for as many as 2,500 CCCDIs to renew their approval. Because they cannot obtain approval, the state's ability to perform these important inspections is sharply reduced. The reduction in the number of eligible CCCDIs poses the risk that cross connections will not be detected and will jeopardize public water supplies. While the Board is confident that the CCCDIs who have already renewed their approval for calendar year 2020 will perform conscientiously, it is not realistic to expect that they also can perform the work of 2,500 CCCDIs who cannot now renew their approval."

While emergency rulemaking by the Board is not unprecedented, it is not an ordinary occurrence. The Board rarely receives a request to adopt emergency rules. In some instances, the Board has been presented with sufficient evidence and argument to allow it to find that "a situation exists which reasonably constitutes a threat to the public interest, safety or welfare" within the meaning of Section 27(c) of the Act and Section 5-45 of the IAPA. In other instances, the Board has not, resulting in use of the regular rulemaking process to address the situation presented.

The Board adopted emergency rules to ameliorate public health and safety threats without first calling for and accepting public comments. These include rulemakings to facilitate disposal of non-hazardous waste in 20 "disaster area" counties impacted by the flooding of the Mississippi River and its tributaries. <u>Emergency Rulemaking: Amendments to the Open-Burning Permit Rules, 35 Ill. Adm. Code 237</u>, R93-15 (Aug. 20, 1993); <u>Emergency Amendments to the Landfill Rules for On-Site Burial of Dead Animals in Flood-Disaster Counties: 35 Ill. Adm. Code 8-7.106</u>, R93-25 (Sept. 23, 1993); <u>RCRA Subtitle D Extension 35 Ill. Adm. Code 814 (Emergency Rule)</u>, R94-13 (May 5, 1994) (citing adoption of P.A. 88-540, eff. Apr.30, 1994). In each docket, the Board found that the situation qualified as an "emergency" for the affected counties within the meaning of the Act and IAPA.

In the instant request by IEPA, all 102 Illinois counties are under an emergency declaration. Section 27(c) of the Act specifically allows the Board to adopt emergency rules if the Governor declares an emergency. The Board further finds that a declared emergency is sufficient to find that failure to adopt these rules could reasonably constitute a threat to the public interest, safety, or welfare under Section 5-45(a) of the IAPA. The Board is further persuaded by IEPA's argument that failure to adopt the rule could impact the economy. The economy is impacted by the need to shelter in place, social distancing, and minimization of workforces throughout the State. Therefore, based on these factors, the Board finds that adoption of the emergency rule is necessary to address issues raised by the emergency declaration.

The Board notes that the 150-day duration of an emergency rule will expire before the extended deadline of October 30, 2020. The Board is considering proposing for first notice a rule at its next meeting. The Board invites comment on that issue by April 30.

### **CONCLUSION**

Governor J.B. Pritzker declared a state of emergency on March 9, 2020, and renewed that declaration on April 1, 2020. Because of the current state of emergency due to the pandemic caused by COVID 19, the Board agrees that an emergency exists and adopts the IEPA's proposed emergency rule.

### <u>ORDER</u>

The Board directs the Clerk to file the following as an emergency rule in the *Illinois Register*:
