Good Afternoon:

I have been having issues with my cell phone and will need to upgrade my phone if additional videos will be required. The dog continues to bark almost every day. I cannot capture the videos in time and when I attempt to video, it stops recording, or the dog is corrected. In any event, the noise abatement is NOT preventative. Mr. Egan allows his dog to bark, causing the nuisances, and although he does correct the dog, depending on where he is and how long it takes for him to get to the dog, addressing the dog after the barking, does not address the noise nuisance abatement because the dog is fixated on me, my cats, and my property, in general. See photos of dog that has worn out the grass from running along the fence to try to gain access to my side if he could.

Hiding the dog and arguing "no barking dog noise" only undermines the situation and proves my case further. The updated Nuisance Noise Report that I will submit, shortly, through the on-line e-file system, presented several times, shows the ineffectiveness of the only solution provided by Mr. Egan (the tarp on the fence), which the defense has presented.

The argument by the defense is that dogs bark. However, I have provided compelling and well-supported case that demonstrates the dog's barking is not a minor inconvenience but a significant and ongoing disturbance that impacts my quality of life and enjoyment of my property.

Sec. 33. Board orders.

(c) In making its orders and determinations, the Board shall take into consideration all the facts and circumstances bearing upon the reasonableness of the emissions, discharges or deposits involved including, but not limited to:

(i) the character and degree of injury to, or interference with the protection of the health, general welfare and physical property of the people;

(iv) the technical practicability and economic reasonableness of reducing or eliminating the

emissions, discharges or deposits resulting from such pollution source; and
