



Missouri universities strike a deal

No tuition hikes for no budget cuts

COLUMBIA, Mo. — Missouri's public universities have struck a deal with Gov. Jay Nixon: They'll stop raising tuition if lawmakers spare them from the recession-driven budget cuts likely to hammer the rest of state government.

Nixon touted his agreement Wednesday at the University of Missouri's flagship campus, followed by scheduled stops at Harris-Stowe State University in St. Louis and the University of Missouri-Kansas City.

Tuition at state colleges and universities has increased every year for at least the past decade. At the same time, Missouri's per-capita spending on higher education hovers near the bottom, ranking 47th among the 50 states.

"For the first time in a long time, the pool of money that goes to higher education is not the place we're going to go hunting for the cuts," he said.

The proposal by Nixon, a Democrat who took office last week, requires approval by the Republican-controlled Legislature, which will write the state

budget. Nixon's deal applies only to the 2010 fiscal year, meaning universities still could face midyear budget cuts during the current fiscal year that runs through June 30.

Nixon's announcement received mixed reviews from Republican legislative leaders, who noted they don't yet have a consensus on how much revenue the state is projected to receive next fiscal year.

"Nobody wants to cut higher education, but I don't know if that's entirely possible, given the situation we face," said Senate President Pro Tem Charlie Shields, R-St. Joseph.

"When you pronounce one segment of the budget that

you're immune from cuts, essentially I think you're telling the rest of the segments that you will be cut," Shields added.

Nixon acknowledged that such a promise could create more drastic budget cuts in other areas. The state faces a projected shortfall as high as \$342 million by the close of the current fiscal year.

Nixon declined to offer details on what services could be trimmed to balance the state's budget, as required by the Missouri Constitution. Nixon said those details will emerge on Tuesday, when he unveils his budget proposal at his first State of the State address.

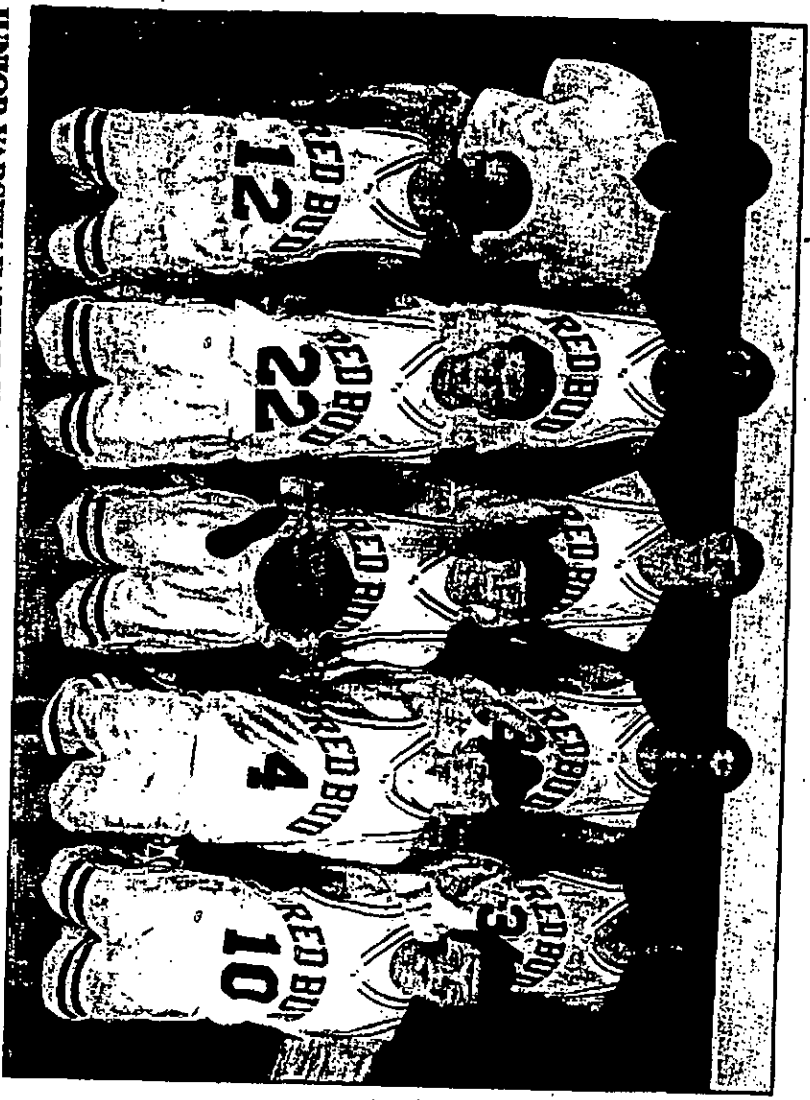

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POLLUTION VARIANCE

Dynegy Midwest Generation, Inc. ("Dynegy") with sources located in Randolph County, Mason County, Vermillion County, Madison County and Putnam County, has filed with the Illinois Pollution Control Board ("Board") a petition for variance under Title IX of the Environmental Protection Act ("Act") [415 ILCS 5/Sec. 35-38]. The Board has the authority pursuant to Section 35 of the Act [415 ILCS 5/35] and 35 Ill. Adm. Code 104 to grant a variance. Dynegy requests a variance from a provision of the Illinois Multi-Pollutant Standard ("MPS"), 35 Ill. Adm. Code 225.233, as applied to Unit 3 at the Baldwin Energy Complex (10901 Baldwin Road, Baldwin, Illinois 62217) for a period beginning July 1, 2009 through March 31, 2010. Specifically, Dynegy seeks a variance from the MPS requirement in Sections 225.233(c)(1)(A) and 225.233(c)(2) to inject, beginning July 1, 2009, halogenated activated carbon at a minimum injection rate of 5.0 pounds per million actual cubic feet ("lbs/macf") exhaust gas flow and from related monitoring, recordkeeping, and reporting requirements set forth in Sections 225.210(b) and (d) and 225.233(c)(5). Two other coal-fired power plants will be affected by the conditions of the variance, the Havana Power Station (15260 North State Route 78, Havana, Illinois 62644) and the Hennepin Power Station (13498 C 800 St., Hennepin, Illinois 61327). A copy of this variance may be obtained through the Clerk's Office at the Board. The Board's office address is Pollution Control Board, James R. Thompson Center, 100 West Randolph Street, Suite 11-500, Chicago, Illinois 60601 (telephone: 312/814-3620).

The Illinois EPA solicits the views of persons who may be affected by the variance. Address any comments or inquires to: John J. The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency ("Illinois EPA") is preparing a recommendation, and, unless otherwise ordered by the hearing officer or Board, plans to file the recommendation by February 23, 2009. The record will remain open for written comments for 45 days after the filing of the recommendation and should be submitted to the Board at the address specified above. The record is available at the Board office for inspection, except those portions that are protected from disclosure under 35 Ill. Adm. Code 130. Procedures are available whereby disclosure may be sought by the public.

A hearing may be held after the filing of the recommendation. However, if a written objection to the variance and a request for hearing are received by the Board office, no later than twenty-one (21) days from the publication of this Notice, the Board must conduct a hearing on the petition.

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


