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Page 4 1 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Good 2 morning. My name is Carol Webb. This is the 3 hearing for AC 11-13, IEPA versus Ray Newingham. It 4 is November 2, 2011, and we are beginning at 5 10 o'clock a.m. 6 I will note for the record 7 that there are no members of the public present. 8 At issue in this case is the 9 Agency's allegation that respondent violated 10 Sections 21(p)(1) and (p)(7) of the Environmental 11 Protection Act at his site in Roodhouse, Greene 12 County. 13 This hearing was noticed 14 pursuant to the Act and the Board's rules and will 15 be conducted pursuant to Sections 101.600 through 16 101.632 of the Board's procedural rules. 17 At this time, I would like to 18 ask the parties to make their appearances on the 19 record. 20 MS. RYAN: Michelle Ryan, Special 21 Assistant Attorney General for the Illinois EPA. 22 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. And I 23 will note for the regard that Mr. Ray Newingham is 24 not present at the moment. If he arrives later

Page 5 during this hearing, I will be sure to announce 1 2 that. 3 Are there any preliminary matters to discuss on the record? 4 5 MS. RYAN: No. 6 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Would 7 you care to make an opening statement? 8 MS. RYAN: Yes. 9 We believe the evidence today 10 will show that on September 16, 2010, open dumping resulting in litter and the deposition of 11 construction and demolition debris occurred at the 12 13 corner of Worchester and Clay Streets in Roodhouse, Greene County, Illinois, and that there are no 14 15 defenses to this activity. 16 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Would 17 you like to call your first witness? 18 MS. RYAN: Yes. We call Charlie 19 King. 20 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Would the 21 court reporter please swear in the witness? 22 (Whereupon the witness was sworn 23 by the reporter.) 24

I conduct RCRA hazardous waste, 8 landfill complaint investigations. 9 I also inspect on occasion 10 PIMW which is potential infectious medical waste sites and compost facilities. 11 12 Q. What's your educational background? 13 I have an Associate's in Arts Α. 14 degree from Parkland College in Champaign, Illinois. 15 I have a Bachelor's of Science degree from Illinois State University, and I have a Master's in Science 16 17 degree from Illinois State University. 18 Ο. Have you had any additional 19 training related to your job besides this 20 educational background? 21 Α. On-the-job training, different 22 schools, different courses. I went to RCRA 23 hazardous waste inspection training in Colorado. 24 I've been to several MEEA (Midwest Environmental

Page 8 1 Enforcement Association) trainings in Michigan and St. Louis, Missouri and in Springfield, Illinois. 2 3 I've been in the Marine Corps for three years, and 4 some things that I've learned in the Marine Corps 5 apply. I was a manager of my own office, so I had 6 administrative experience. 7 Are you familiar with the Newingham Q. 8 property on the corners of Worchester and Clay in 9 Roodhouse? 10 Α. Yes, I am. 11 Q. And who owns that property? 12 Α. Ray Newingham. 13 Q. How many inspections have you done 14 at that property? 15 Α. Approximately four. 16 I'm going to show you what I have Ο. 17 had marked as Exhibit 1 for identification, and I'm 18 going to ask you if you recognize this document. 19 Α. Yes, I do. 20 Ο. And what is that? 21 This is my inspection report for Α. 22 the inspection conducted on September 16, 2010. 23 It's preceded by a checklist, an open dump 24 inspection checklist, and then it has my narrative,

Page 9 1 my reinspection report document, which is a 2 memorandum, and it also has a site sketch and photographs of the site. 3 4 Is this a fair, accurate and Q. 5 complete copy of your report? 6 Α. Yes, it is. 7 Can you describe this property Q. 8 generally? 9 Α. The property consists of primarily 10 demolition wastes that were formed or occurred there because two buildings collapsed in that community in 11 12 2009. 13 And where is the corner of Q. 14 Worchester and Clay with respect to Roodhouse? 15 Α. It's approximately one block west 16 of the main part of the town or, I'm sorry, east, 17 east of the main part of the town; pretty much 18 centrally located. 19 Q. Who took the photographs attached 20 to your report? 21 Α. I did. 22 Q. Okay. Starting with photograph 23 number 1, can you tell us what they show? 24 It's a picture of the site from the Α.

Page 10 northwest corner of Worchester and Clay Streets. 1 2 Q. Go ahead and continue through the 3 photographs. 4 Α. Exposure 2 is the east side of the 5 site from the north side of Clay Street. 6 Photo number 3 is the site 7 from across Clay Street from the east side of the 8 site. 9 Photograph number 4 is looking 10 down the north side of the site from across Clay Street. 11 12 Photograph number 5 is demolition waste and a television on the north side 13 of the site. The television is in the foreground of 14 15 that photo. 16 Photograph number 6 is a gap 17 that shows a path to the basement on the north side 18 of the site, so in the rubble, you can look down 19 through and you can see the basement. 20 Is that that black area sort of Q. toward the center? 21 22 Α. Yes, that's correct, just right of 23 those bricks or just to the left of those bricks. 24 Sorry.

Page 11 1 Photograph number 7 are two 2 gallons of compressed gas tanks, electrical 3 components, pipe, plastics, metals, vehicle battery, 4 and a road warning saw horse. It was extra waste 5 that seemed to be laying around or appeared to be 6 laying around. 7 0. Now, the road warning saw horse, 8 that's not being used to mark off the site at this 9 point, is it? 10 Α. It didn't appear to be used for 11 anything. It was just laying there. 12 Photograph number 8 is a 13 two-gallon compressed gas tank, conduits, metals, 14 plastics, stacks of bricks, wood pallets and wire. 15 Photograph number 9 shows some 16 stacked bricks, but it also shows the demolition 17 site or the collapsed buildings, the demolished 18 buildings and pallets with stacked bricks on them. 19 Photograph number 10 are piles 20 of asphalt, dirt and brick, a used tire. The brick 21 appears to be from the demolished buildings on site, and the dirt and the asphalt appear to have been 22 brought in from off-site. They were not there 23 24 during previous inspections. The brick was but the

Page 12 asphalt, the piles of asphalt and dirt and the used 1 2 tires did not appear to be there during previous 3 inspections. Photograph number 11 is the 4 5 site from just beyond the southeast corner. 6 Photograph number 12 is the 7 south side of the demolished buildings. 8 Photograph number 13 shows 9 garbage and general household refuse in the 10 foreground and demolition waste throughout the site. 11 Photograph number 14 shows a 12 toilet, saw blade, wood, brick, metal and metal desk, plaster, drywall, and a fan. 13 Photograph number 15 shows a 14 mattress, kitchen sink, plastic, metals, brick and 15 other demolition wastes. 16 17 Photograph number 16 shows PVC pipe, corrugated hose, used tires, shingles, wood, 18 19 brick and metals. 20 Photograph number 17 shows 21 insulation, metals, wood and brick. 22 Photograph number 18 shows the 23 site from the southwest. 24 Photograph number 19 shows a

Page 13 1 posted private property and no trespassing sign in 2 front of the demolition waste. 3 Photograph number 20 shows a 4 large hole in the site floor near the sidewalk along the south side of Clay Street looking into the 5 basement of one of the collapsed buildings. 6 7 And photograph number 21 shows 8 carpet, wood, metal, bricks, pipes, conduit and 9 other waste. 10 0. Do these photographs accurately depict what you saw on September 16, 2010? 11 12 Yes, they do. Α. 13 Q. Approximately when was this report generated? 14 15 Α. This report was generated on 16 October 6, 2010. 17 Q. Does Illinois EPA keep these 18 reports in the regular course of its business? 19 Α. Yes, it does. 20 Is it the regular course of 0. 21 Illinois EPA's business to make such records at or 22 reasonably after the event reflected thereon? 23 Α. Yes, it is. 24 MS. RYAN: At this time we'd move

Page 14 1 Exhibit 1 into evidence. 2 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Exhibit 1 is 3 admitted into evidence. 4 (Whereupon IEPA Exhibit 1 was 5 admitted into evidence at this 6 time.) 7 MS. RYAN: I don't have anything further. 8 9 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Mr. 10 Newingham is not here to cross-examine the Agency's 11 witness, and he is also not here to present his case 12 so let's go off the record for a minute and discuss a briefing schedule. 13 14 (Whereupon an off-the-record 15 discussion transpired at this 16 time.) 17 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Let's go back on the record. 18 19 The transcript is due on November 15th and will be posted on the Board's 20 21 website. The public comment deadline is 22 November 16th. Any public comment must be filed in 23 accordance with Section 101.628 of the Board's 24 procedural rules. The complainant's brief is due by

Page 15 1 November 28th, and respondent's brief will be due by 2 December 12th. 3 If no brief is filed by 4 December 12th, the Board may assume that respondent 5 will not be filing a brief. 6 Ms. Ryan, would you care to 7 make any closing argument? 8 MS. RYAN: No. I'll reserve that 9 for my brief. Thank you. 10 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. At this time, I will just again note that there are no 11 12 members of the public present, and Mr. Newingham is 13 not present so I will conclude the proceedings. 14 We stand adjourned.
