- 1 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. We'll go
- 2 ahead and begin. Good morning. My name is Carol Webb
- 3 and this is the hearing for AC 10-30, Jackson County v.
- 4 Frances Klink. It's November 8th, 2011, and we are
- 5 beginning at 10:30 a.m.
- 6 I'll note for the record there are no members
- of the public present, although Mrs. Klink's family is
- 8 present.
- At issue in this case is the County's
- 10 allegation that Respondent violated sections 21(p)(1),
- (p)(3) and (p)(7) of the Environmental Protection Act at
- 12 her site in Murphysboro, Jackson County. This hearing
- was noticed pursuant to the Act and the board's rules and
- will be conducted pursuant to sections 101.600 through
- 15 101.632 of the board's procedural rules.
- At this time I will ask the parties to please
- make their appearances on the record.
- 18 MR. BRENNER: Daniel Brenner, Assistant
- 19 State's Attorney, County of Jackson.
- HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. And, Ms.
- 21 Klink, you're here representing yourself, is that
- 22 correct?
- MS. KLINK: Yes.
- 24 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Are there any
- 25 preliminary matters you wish to discuss on the record?

- 1 MR. BRENNER: No, just a very brief opening
- 2 statement.
- 3 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Go ahead.
- 4 MR. BRENNER: The County has filed an
- 5 administrative citation under the Illinois Environmental
- 6 Protection Act, and pursuant to that there was an
- 7 inspection conducted on this parcel on May 11th, 2010.
- 8 That parcel is owned by Miss Frances Klink who is the
- 9 respondent here today. We believe that the evidence
- should show she's the owner of, controls, and resides at
- 11 81 Our Lane in Murphysboro, Illinois, which is also the
- 12 parcel at issue here.
- The evidence will also show that on that day
- 14 there was observed open dump waste and various debris as
- 15 well as evidence of open burning. The site is still not
- in compliance. The evidence will show that as well. The
- 17 evidence will also show that the debris contained general
- 18 construction demolition debris or clean construction
- 19 debris as defined by the Illinois Environmental
- 20 Protection Act.
- There is three violations that have been cited
- 22 by the hearing officer, 21(p)(1), 21(p)(3) and 21(p)(7),
- which are respectively litter, open burning and
- 24 deposition of construction demolition debris. That's my
- 25 opening.

- 1 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Ms. Klink, would you
- like to make an opening statement? You don't have to. 2
- 3 MS. KLINK: I don't have to.
- 4 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Well, the
- County may call its witness. 5
- 6 MR. BRENNER: I'd like to call Mr. Terry.
- 7 DON TERRY
- of lawful age, being first duly sworn to tell the truth,
- the whole truth and nothing but the truth, says as
- follows: 10
- 11 DIRECT EXAMINATION
- 12 BY MR. BRENNER:
- 13 Mr. Terry, what is your name and occupation?
- 14 My name is Don Terry. I'm an environmental Α.
- 15 compliance inspector for Jackson County.
- 16 And how long have you been doing that
- occupation? 17
- 18 Α. Eight and a half years.
- 19 Ο. And tell us briefly what you do.
- 20 Generally my job is to investigate complaints Α.
- and situations regarding open dumping and burning within 21
- 22 the county.
- 23 Have you received any special training related Q.
- 24 to your occupation?
- 25 Yes. I completed the Illinois EPA's inspector

- 1 training course.
- So you have an occupation-specific license and
- certifications? 3
- Α. The Illinois EPA certified me as an
- inspector for nonhazardous solid waste management sites. 5
- 6 Do you know if the County has a delegation
- 7 agreement with the Illinois Environmental Protection
- Agency?
- 9 Α. Yes, it does.
- 10 Ο. And what does that delegation agreement allow?
- It allows for the investigation and inspection 11
- 12 of situations like this.
- 13 Does that delegation agreement also include the Ο.
- 14 prosecution of these --
- 15 Α. Yes, it does.
- 16 Ο. -- alleged offenses?
- 17 Α. Yes.
- 18 Q. And is the Jackson County Health Department
- 19 part of the County of Jackson?
- 20 Α. Yes.
- 21 Q. Do you believe this present administrative
- 22 citation enforcement action is within that delegation
- 23 group?
- 24 Α. Yes.
- 25 Q. Are you familiar with the Respondent, Frances

- 1 Klink?
- 2 Α. Yes.
- 3 Q. She's here today?
- Α. Yes.
- Ο. And did you inspect the site on May 11th, 2010?
- I did. Α.
- 7 0. And that site was identified with the site code
- of 0778145040? 8
- 9 Α. Yes.
- 10 Q. Or commonly known as 81 Our Lane?
- 11 Α. Yes.
- 12 Murphysboro, Illinois? Q.
- 13 Α. Yes.
- 14 Who owns the site? 0.
- 15 Α. Frances Klink.
- 16 Q. And who currently occupies the site?
- 17 Mrs. Klink. And I know that there are two or Α.
- three other residents there. I think there are a couple 18
- 19 of tenants, and I think her daughter lives there.
- 20 Taking you back to May 11th, 2010, do you Q.
- 21 recollect what you saw on the site that day?
- 22 Α. Yeah. On that particular day, which was
- cloudy, a little bit of wind, about 78 degrees, when I 23
- 24 entered the site, excuse me, which was -- is a little
- over six acres in size, driving up to the lane to go to 25

- 1 the residence I observed material that was open dumped on
- 2 the site. It was material that was not in use and was
- 3 not being protected for future use.
- 4 Q. Okay. If I may, I'm going to hand you what
- 5 I've identified as Exhibit 1. This would be County's
- 6 Exhibit 1. Could you identify that document, please?
- 7 I'm also handing a copy to Ms. Klink and to the judge as
- 8 well. Could you identify that document, please?
- 9 A. Yes. These are the photo sheets of the photos
- 10 that I took during that inspection.
- 11 Q. Okay. And do the photos accurately and fairly
- 12 depict the site's condition as you observed them that
- 13 day?
- 14 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Let's go through those photos, if you
- 16 will. On the first -- very first photo, just to make
- 17 sure we're on the same page, identified as 01 -- the last
- number is 01, what is that photo? What's in that photo?
- 19 A. The materials that are lying outside on the
- 20 ground are objects such as gasoline cans or fuel cans,
- 21 furniture, and various items like that, which are
- 22 overgrown with vegetation.
- Q. And in photo 02 below it?
- A. There is a camper top or a truck top, some
- 25 dimensional lumber, and a motorized lawnmower sitting,

- 1 again, outside unprotected.
- Q. On page 2, photograph three, what can you
- 3 identify in that picture?
- 4 A. There's just various metal containers, plastic
- 5 containers. Let's see, some plastic lawn ornaments.
- 6 Different things like that, again, sitting outside, not
- 7 in use and not protected for future use.
- 8 Q. Again, you took these photos?
- 9 A. I did.
- 10 Q. Photo 4, below that photo.
- 11 A. You see some -- particle board is what I call
- 12 it. There's electrical wiring that's wrapped up in a
- 13 bunch. Different things like that. A tarp that has been
- 14 weathered and has really been rendered useless, among
- other materials that are wedged into that particular
- 16 metal frame structure.
- Okay. On page 3, if I could, direct your
- 18 attention to photograph number five, what do you see
- 19 there?
- 20 A. Just a collection of different kinds of
- 21 furniture, wooden boxes, things like that.
- Q. And below it, photograph six?
- A. There are open coolers, open plastic
- 24 containers, metal pipe structures, different things that,
- again, are outside unprotected and you can see vegetation

- 1 growing up through them.
- Q. Okay. Continuing on page 4, photograph seven,
- 3 what do you see there?
- A. More material, plastic items, plastic crates,
- 5 containers, things like that.
- 6 Q. And below it photograph number eight?
- 7 A. You see some metal railing. Let's see, a
- 8 plastic container filled -- several plastic containers.
- 9 Some plywood in the background. Things like that, once
- 10 again, lying on the ground unprotected.
- 11 Q. Okay. Direct your attention to page number 5,
- 12 photograph nine. What do you see there?
- 13 A. What I would consider an abandoned vehicle.
- Q. Would you consider the vehicle abandoned?
- 15 A. I would. If you notice the vegetation growing
- 16 up around it. There's no evidence it's been disturbed.
- 17 And one of the definitions of an abandoned vehicle is
- 18 that it hasn't been moved or used in seven consecutive
- 19 days.
- 20 Q. Do you believe that vehicle is driv -- is
- 21 operable?
- 22 A. I would really have no idea for that particular
- vehicle, but it hasn't been used.
- Q. Okay. Photograph number ten.
- A. Again, just a collection of different kinds of

- 1 plastic furniture, metal containers, plastic containers
- 2 sitting up against a camper-type vehicle.
- Q. Okay. And on page 6, photograph 11?
- 4 A. You see an open suitcase. There's a hose on
- 5 the ground. There are metal objects, a wooden chair.
- 6 There's a metal -- like a sliding closet door. Things
- 7 like this laying outside being grown up and also not
- 8 being protected.
- 9 Q. And in photograph 12?
- 10 A. Two vehicles sitting between a mobile home and
- 11 a shed. Again, appear to be abandoned, given that the
- 12 vegetation is growing up around it, as well as a pile of
- 13 material to the right containing a waste tire, springs,
- 14 other materials.
- 15 Q. All right. Page 7, photograph 13.
- 16 A. You see a closer view of the one pile I just
- 17 described with the tire and the metal springs. Another
- 18 pile in the back. A metal fuel container of some kind.
- 19 A grey truck, which appears abandoned. Once again, no
- 20 evidence it appears to have been moved in seven
- 21 consecutive days.
- Q. Photograph 14?
- 23 A. You see some cloth furniture, like a chair.
- You see some metal folding chairs laying up against the
- 25 frame of a mobile home. The mobile home is in a state of

- being demolished. The flooring is rotting on that with 1
- 2 other materials lying on top of that.
- 3 Okay. Directing your attention to page 8, Ο.
- 4 photograph 15.
- 5 Some bicycles, a part of the mobile home that Α.
- 6 is lying on its top. So that would be the walls of the
- 7 mobile home. You see some carpeting there as well as in
- the foreground there roofing material.
- 9 Q. Would that be construction debris, you believe?
- Α. Yes, I would. 10
- 11 Demolition debris? Ο.
- 12 Α. Yes.
- 13 0. Photograph 16, please.
- 14 Α. Again, it's the demoed mobile home. You see
- 15 plants growing up around it. You also see the
- 16 interior -- some of the interior contents, including some
- 17 of the furniture, some of the carpet, carpet padding,
- 18 things like that.
- 19 0. All right. Page 9, photograph 17.
- 20 Α. Again, part of the wall and top of the mobile
- 21 home.
- 22 Q. Photograph 18?
- 23 Α. Photograph 18 shows several metal containers,
- 24 the closest one containing a great deal of coated
- 25 electrical wiring.

- 1 Q. Okay. Direct your attention to page 10 and
- 2 photograph 19.
- A. In 19 we see a large pontoon-type boat with
- 4 vegetation growing up around it. There's a couple of
- 5 waste tires lying on the ground next to it, and also two,
- 6 what I would call, above-ground fuel storage tanks also
- 7 lying on the ground.
- 8 Q. Photograph 20?
- 9 A. Photograph 20 shows a collection of waste tires
- 10 lying on the ground outside uncovered.
- 11 Q. Page 11 now, photograph 21.
- 12 A. In photograph 21 I observed a waste pile where
- 13 burning had occurred within the waste pile. I observed
- 14 lumber, the rusting charred springs of a mattress, also
- ash, metal cans, things like this.
- Q. Photograph 22?
- 17 A. There was a second smaller pile next to that
- one pile, again with ash. There's metal food cans in
- 19 there, dimensional lumber.
- Q. Page 12, photograph 23?
- 21 A. This is a different view of the larger burn
- 22 pile. Again you can see charred dimensional lumber.
- There's ash. You can see metal cans within the pile.
- Q. And photograph 24?
- 25 A. Is a truck which appears abandoned, given that

- 1 it's sitting there growing -- with vegetation growing up
- 2 around it. There's also waste tires nearby.
- Q. Page 13, photograph 25?
- A. Another abandoned vehicle. Again, you can see
- 5 trees and grass and other vegetation growing up around
- 6 it. There is a recently mowed path near it, and there
- 7 was no evidence that the truck had disturbed any of the
- 8 vegetation around it.
- 9 Q. And photograph 26?
- 10 A. Two more abandoned vehicles that were sitting
- in a wooded area with vegetation growing up around them.
- 12 Q. Okay. And on page 14 now, photograph 27?
- A. An abandoned vehicle. This is a bus. You can
- 14 see the vegetation growing up around it. And, again,
- there was no evidence that this vehicle had been moved,
- 16 because there was some -- the vegetation around it had
- 17 not been disturbed.
- 18 Q. Photograph 28?
- A. A vehicle sitting in a field, again, apparently
- 20 abandoned, given that the vegetation around it had not
- 21 been disturbed.
- Q. Okay. Page 15, photograph 29?
- 23 A. This is another burn pile. This is behind a
- 24 mobile home, so it was north of the mobile home where,
- you know, there was household garbage, ash, different

- 1 things like that. And you also see sitting close to it
- 2 in the background a little bit was a plastic metal barrel
- 3 that had somewhat melted, indicating that the burning had
- 4 occurred here.
- 5 Q. And photograph 30?
- 6 A. Is what I can see from this particular angle of
- 7 another abandoned vehicle, which is a bus sitting down in
- 8 a lower wooded area.
- 9 Q. Page 16, photograph 31?
- 10 A. This is like a collection of different
- 11 materials. There's a -- like a truck camper top,
- 12 different things like that sitting on the ground in a
- wooded area with vegetation growing up around it.
- Q. Photograph 32?
- 15 A. The back end of the one bus can be seen. You
- 16 can also see a larger, like, black and white truck
- 17 sitting in a field. And, again, no evidence that those
- 18 items or those vehicles had been moved in the last seven
- 19 days.
- Q. Okay. Page 17, please, photograph 33?
- 21 A. What we see here is some fencing, some
- 22 plywood-like material lying on the ground, some waste
- 23 tires also lying on the ground that are not in use, being
- used, or being protected for future use.
- Q. Okay. Photograph 34?

- 1 A. Another possible spot where you can see
- 2 material like roofing tin, dimensional lumber, different
- 3 things like that, construction demolition debris sitting
- 4 outside and not being protected for future use.
- 5 Q. Okay. Page 18, photograph 35?
- A. It's another pile near the one we just
- 7 discussed. There was, like, a television stand lying
- 8 upside-down, some plastic material, and some rolls of
- 9 fencing -- metal fencing that were being overgrown by
- 10 vegetation.
- 11 Q. Photograph 36?
- 12 A. This is a pile of loose lumber and railroad
- 13 ties that were sitting. You can see vegetation growing
- over them. You can see weeds on it where the material
- has not been protected for future use.
- Q. And finally on page 19, photograph 37?
- 17 A. This is just a small pile near a mobile home
- 18 where the railroad ties were. Just a collection of
- 19 material, again, wooden items, plastic items that were
- 20 being overgrown by vegetation.
- Q. And all of these photos were taken on her site
- 22 on that day?
- 23 A. Yes.
- 24 Q. On May 10th?
- 25 A. May 11th.

- 1 Q. I'm sorry, May 11, 2010.
- MR. BRENNER: Judge, I'd like to admit
- 3 those photographs for the record.
- 4 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Exhibit 1 is
- 5 admitted into the record.
- 6 MR. LARRY KLINK: May I speak for just a
- 7 brief minute?
- 8 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Not yet.
- 9 Q. (By Mr. Brenner) I'm going to hand you what
- 10 I've identified as Exhibit 2. Can you please identify
- 11 that as well? The record will reflect I'm handing a copy
- 12 to Ms. Klink as well as the law judge.
- 13 A. Yes. This is the inspection narrative that I
- 14 wrote and submitted along with the rest of my inspection
- 15 packet.
- Q. And they support basically your allegations
- 17 here today?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 Q. And also is there contained in there a map of
- 20 this site where each one of the photographs -- or is that
- 21 not part of this?
- 22 A. There was a map, yes.
- MR. BRENNER: Judge, without having him
- 24 retestify to what he's already testified to, we do ask
- 25 this be admitted on the record as well.

- 1 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Exhibit 2 is
- 2 admitted into the record.
- MR. BRENNER: Thank you.
- 4 Q. (By Mr. Brenner) Do you have any idea how this
- 5 material got on this parcel?
- 6 A. From conversations with Mrs. Klink, she said
- 7 that she inherited a great deal of it from, I guess, her
- 8 husband and father, and also she had collected it from
- 9 the estates of a relative or relatives who had passed.
- 10 So some already there, some brought in.
- 11 Q. Could any of the debris that you've identified
- 12 here today, could that be seen from a public road?
- A. A small portion of it could be, yes.
- 14 Q. In your opinion, were any of the violations you
- noted in the inspection report due to uncontrollable
- 16 circumstances?
- 17 A. No.
- 18 Q. Has the site been issued a permit by the EPA to
- store the waste items noted in your inspection?
- 20 A. No.
- Q. Since your inspection has there been any
- improvement in the conditions of the site?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. In your opinion, is the site or is it not in
- 25 compliance with the open dumping laws of the State of

- 1 Illinois?
- A. Currently it's still not in compliance.
- MR. BRENNER: Okay. That's all I have for
- 4 this witness, Judge.
- 5 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Now, Miss
- 6 Klink, you will have a chance to present your own
- 7 defense, but right now I'm just asking you, do you have
- 8 any questions for Mr. Terry about anything he just said?
- 9 MS. KLINK: No.
- 10 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. All right.
- 11 Thank you, Mr. Terry. Do you have anything further?
- MR. BRENNER: We conclude. We rest our
- 13 case, Judge.
- 14 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: All right. Miss
- 15 Klink, you may present your case. The court reporter
- 16 will please swear you in.
- 17 FRANCES KLINK
- of lawful age, being first duly sworn to tell the truth,
- 19 the whole truth and nothing but the truth, says as
- 20 follows:
- 21 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Miss Klink,
- you can go ahead and present your defense in narrative
- 23 form.
- MS. KLINK: Well, to start with, a lot of
- 25 this debris that he has pictures and stuff of was from a

- 1 storm that we had back, what, three years ago, four, that
- 2 came through Murphysboro. The litter and -- it throwed
- 3 that trailer stuff that was all in that one trailer, just
- 4 throwed it all over the yard, everywhere.
- 5 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Wait. I'm going to
- 6 move over here, so you can face this way.
- 7 MS. KLINK: That's where the biggest part
- 8 started right there, was the storm. Trees and
- 9 everything. And trees in my yard, the whole yard, trees
- 10 and everything. And I started trying to clean it up.
- 11 Now, I have pictures of what we have done on
- 12 the site, that we have cleaned it up. Now, who wants to
- 13 see them?
- MS. IMHUFF: Somebody needs to look.
- MR. LARRY KLINK: If you look at what we've
- 16 done compared to -- over half of those pictures --
- 17 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Wait. Let's go off
- 18 the record for a minute.
- 19 (Off-the-record discussion held.)
- HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Back on the record.
- MS. KLINK: Now, I have pictures here of
- 22 what we have cleaned up and what we have done. A lot of
- them pictures he has there has been cleaned up. The cars
- 24 are gone. A lot of the buses are gone. A lot of
- everything is gone. These pictures here, this stuff is

- 1 cleaned up. It's gone. There's a lot of it that's gone.
- 2 It's not there. We've cleaned it up. And I've been
- 3 working the last few days -- and here is a letter that
- 4 I'd like for somebody to read why I'm having trouble
- 5 getting moved as much and as fast as I can. I'm doing it
- 6 as fast as I can.
- 7 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Basically this
- 8 letter is from Mrs. Klink's doctor about her health
- 9 problems.
- MR. BRENNER: Okay. Noted. I'm sorry
- 11 about your health issues.
- MS. KLINK: I mean, I can't help that, you
- 13 know. But I'm doing the best I know how. Now, there's
- one in there around my swing -- the swing is up in the
- 15 trees -- that he complained about and was fussing about.
- 16 That's where I live when the weather is permissible and I
- 17 can be outside. I spent all summer taking stuff and
- 18 cleaning it up, washing it, putting it in a clean box,
- 19 putting it in my other trailer for a yard sale or for an
- 20 auction to sell it. That's my work area. And I do have
- 21 a lot of things sitting around there, but that's my work
- 22 area where I do it in front of that camper. That stuff
- 23 is not all there no more either. It's gone. The only
- 24 thing I really have left in -- that red truck is gone out
- of the one picture. The only thing that I actually have

- left is a blue bus, and it's up on the hill, and it is
- 2 not leaking nowhere, there's no air getting in there.
- 3 It's got boxes of stuff that was my father's that I need
- 4 to go through before it is disposed of or anything.
- Now, the open dumping, I don't know where he's
- 6 calling open dumping. There isn't no actual open dumping
- 7 at my house. That one picture behind that trailer, there
- 8 was a woman lived there, she had two great big old Dane
- 9 dogs or what -- vicious dogs. I couldn't go around and
- 10 help cut nothing out. She's the one that done that
- 11 burning in that barrel. And I told her she wasn't to do
- 12 that, but she wouldn't listen to me. She done it anyway.
- 13 So that was on my shoulders, too.
- The other part, I don't know where he gets open
- dumping, because there hasn't been any open dumping. One
- 16 time there was some dumping done and I wasn't -- I told
- 17 them not to do it. I didn't do it. It accidentally
- 18 caught a fire when we was trying to burn off that bank,
- 19 and we got it out. And we cleaned all that bank off.
- 20 Every bit of that bank has all been cleaned off. There
- 21 is nothing on that bank, no.
- I have trouble remembering things and keeping
- 23 my mind straight with all of it, so I'm going to let my
- 24 son -- if I've left out anything, he can go ahead and
- 25 tell you.

- 1 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Mr. Brenner,
- 2 do you have any questions?
- MR. BRENNER: Just a couple questions.
- 4 CROSS-EXAMINATION
- 5 BY MR. BRENNER:
- 6 Q. One of the things you said was that the
- 7 storm -- I don't know what storm you're talking about --
- 8 is responsible for some of this debris.
- 9 A. Yeah.
- 10 Q. What kind of a storm was that?
- MS. IMHUFF: Mother's Day weekend. It was
- 12 a really bad tornado storm.
- 13 Q. (By Mr. Brenner) Is it your claim all this
- 14 debris was --
- 15 A. I'll show you pictures.
- MS. IMHUFF: The main trailer was --
- 17 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Ma'am, if you'd like
- 18 to give your mother some dates.
- MS. IMHUFF: I live next door and I'm there
- 20 through a lot of this. I want to make sure it's
- 21 accurate.
- 22 A. This red truck is gone from this, and has been
- for I don't know how long.
- Q. (By Mr. Brenner) But the red truck was
- deposited by the storm?

- A. No. I'm getting to that. I'll find the
- 2 picture and I'll show you. All right. This one right
- 3 here is from that storm.
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. This one there. This here is from the storm.
- Q. Now, one of the pictures you pointed to I think
- 7 was picture 18, correct?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 Q. You're claiming picture 17 and 18, those items
- were deposited by the storm?
- 11 A. By the storm. That stuff was in that trailer
- 12 all over the place.
- 13 Q. But you admit that the vehicles, the boats, the
- 14 tires were not deposited there by the storm, correct?
- 15 A. No. The houseboat was my houseboat. I was on
- 16 the lake many, many years with it.
- 17 Q. And the storm does not cause the open burning,
- 18 correct?
- 19 A. No, it did not.
- Q. That's all the questions I have.
- 21 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Thank you.
- 22 All right.
- MR. BRENNER: Thank you, Ms. Klink.
- HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Thank you, Ms.
- 25 Klink. It's my understanding that Ms. Klink's son,

- 1 Larry, would like to testify in this matter, also. Mr.
- 2 Klink, if you'd like to come up here and maybe have a
- 3 seat right there, the court reporter will swear you.
- 4 LARRY KLINK
- of lawful age, being first duly sworn to tell the truth,
- 6 the whole truth and nothing but the truth, says as
- 7 follows:
- MR. LARRY KLINK: On the pictures he's not
- 9 really giving mom a chance to tell him what we've done.
- 10 All these pictures, I can go through here and show you
- 11 over three-quarters of these pictures is cleaned up and
- 12 gone. There's a few things we've moved. We're still
- 13 cleaning up. I've been trying to get rid of it. It's
- just hard to do with her income. She can't afford to be
- 15 paying somebody to do it. I actually rented two of them
- 16 great big -- I don't know what they call them -- like,
- 30-foot dumpsters, and we filled two of those up, got rid
- 18 of them. Then we hauled all the cars off. There's one
- 19 car out there that runs, has a license on it. It's my
- 20 nephew's car. And there's a vehicle in the back, and one
- 21 bus we pulled up on the hill so we can go through it and
- get rid of it. But, I mean, we're trying.
- This shed here, everything around this shed is
- 24 gone. Cleaned up. I cleaned the side, cut the trees
- 25 down. The lawnmower has been pulled out and mowed. It's

- 1 leaving this weekend. This picture here is totally
- 2 cleaned up. I mean, she's got a picture showing it.
- 3 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Which picture are
- 4 you pointing to?
- 5 MR. LARRY KLINK: Let me get the pictures
- and show them to you, ma'am, while we're talking.
- 7 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Now, what are these
- pictures that you're showing me?
- 9 MR. LARRY KLINK: This is that shed right
- 10 there. As you can see, we've totally cleaned all around
- 11 the side, cut the trees down, got rid of everything
- 12 around the shed. Gas cans, all smashed up, gone.
- HEARING OFFICER WEBB: You're saying the
- 14 items in photo one have been removed?
- MR. LARRY KLINK: Yes, ma'am. And this one
- 16 here, this is the lawnmower. Shows it sitting here. I
- 17 think that's it. Yes. And the camper shell, we moved
- 18 all this out and mowed around it. The lawnmower is
- 19 pulled out so it can be gone this weekend. The camper
- 20 shell is still sitting on the ground. We mowed under it
- 21 and set it back down.
- On this page, she's cleaned some of this stuff
- 23 around here and got rid of it. This here has totally
- 24 been cleaned up.
- 25 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. I don't know

- 1 how many of these photos you have.
- 2 MR. LARRY KLINK: I have photos of almost
- 3 all these showing we cleaned them up.
- 4 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: It's --
- 5 MR. BRENNER: I'll object to them on the
- 6 basis that they are not relevant.
- 7 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: I can take them with
- 8 me as an offer of proof, but the board -- they generally
- 9 will not be relevant. But I can take them with me.
- MR. LARRY KLINK: Well, like I say, we just
- 11 cleaned everything up. We're trying. Everybody works.
- 12 All us kids work. Mom can't do nothing hardly, so we try
- 13 to help when we can. And we didn't really think it was
- 14 that big of a deal until everybody started pushing
- 15 everybody.
- You're talking about can you see it from the
- 17 road. We're a block off the road. You can see parcels
- down the road, some items, just a small portion. If you
- 19 drive down the road two blocks, there's a guy that's got
- 20 40 cars sitting there in his yard and ain't 50 feet off
- 21 the road. Grass, weeds all around and everything else.
- 22 Why ain't they bothering him? They are bothering her and
- 23 she's not even on the main road. You can't even see it.
- 24 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: So, Mr. Klink, if I
- 25 can just summarize then, you're testifying basically that

- 1 the items in the -- most of the items in the photograph,
- 2 to your knowledge, have been cleaned up since then?
- MR. LARRY KLINK: I think there's 37
- 4 pictures, and I'm going to say we got at least 30 of them
- 5 that have been cleaned up, them spots.
- 6 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Well, if you
- 7 would like me to, I can take those photos as an offer of
- 8 proof. I'm not going to admit them into the record.
- 9 But, if you like, the board can take a look at them.
- MR. LARRY KLINK: That's fine. So somebody
- 11 can see we've done stuff. We're not just slacking off
- 12 here. We're trying.
- HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Hang on. Mr.
- 14 Brenner, do you have any questions for Mr. Klink?
- MR. BRENNER: I do not. Thank you.
- MR. LARRY KLINK: And the old mobile home
- 17 he kept talking about, it's totally gone. The wind
- 18 blowed it apart and we had to haul it off. But that
- 19 whole lot is cleaned, mowed, all that stuff is gone.
- HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay.
- MS. KLINK: Do they not want where we
- 22 hauled this off? Do they not want them either?
- MR. LARRY KLINK: We've got truckloads of
- 24 metal and everything.
- 25 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: One at a time. If

- 1 you'd like, I can take those. I'm not going to admit
- them into the record, but if you would like me to present
- 3 them to the board, if you'd like to make an offer of
- 4 proof --
- 5 MS. KLINK: I'd like to have them back.
- 6 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: I can't do that. If
- you want to keep them, you need to keep them.
- MR. BRENNER: If I can help on this. We
- 9 acknowledge that they have made efforts in cleaning that
- site up, and we have worked with them since May of 2010
- 11 to get this site cleaned up. It's unfortunate we are
- 12 here today because we hoped you'd have the site cleaned
- 13 up.
- MS. KLINK: I'm trying.
- MR. LARRY KLINK: You're talking 40 years
- 16 of stuff. We're trying.
- MR. BRENNER: So I'll say on the record, we
- 18 are aware of these tickets. We've --
- 19 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Yeah. I'll let you
- 20 keep these because, really, the board isn't going to do
- 21 much with them. Okay? So, Mr. Klink, you're finished
- 22 testifying; is that right?
- MR. LARRY KLINK: Yeah, because I get upset
- when I start talking, so I need to stop.
- 25 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Okay. Anybody else?

- MS. IMHUFF: I just have one question. Why
- 2 is his pictures gold but ours are nothing? That doesn't
- 3 make sense as far as evidence.
- 4 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Well, I'll discuss
- 5 it with you after the hearing. Okay?
- 6 MS. IMHUFF: I'm just curious how this
- 7 works, ma'am.
- 8 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: All right. Let's go
- 9 off the record for a minute to discuss a briefing
- 10 schedule.
- 11 (Off-the-record discussion held.)
- 12 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: The transcript is
- due on November 21st and will be posted on the board's
- 14 website. The public comment deadline is November 22nd.
- 15 Any public comment must be filed in accordance with
- section 101.628 of the board's procedural rules.
- 17 Complainant's brief is due by January 21st, 2012, and
- 18 Respondent's brief will be due by February 29th. If a
- 19 brief is not filed by that date, the board may assume
- that Respondent will not be filing a brief.
- 21 Mr. Brenner, would you like to make any closing
- 22 argument?
- MR. BRENNER: No, I would not. Thank you.
- 24 HEARING OFFICER WEBB: Ms. Klink, you
- 25 probably don't want to make a closing argument?
