

RE: In the Matter of CAFOs: Proposed Amendments to 35 Ill. Adm. Code Parts 501, 502, and 504 (R-2012-023)

Dear Members of the Illinois Pollution Control Board:

As a former Jo Daviess County resident and huge supporter of the "family farm" I am writing this letter to strongly urge your agency to strengthen regulations concerning large CAFO's both residing in and attempting to build facilities in Illinois.

In my opinion, I witnessed firsthand the lies, deceit, and collusion between the Illinois Department of Agriculture and "big ag" at every level of our Illinois government with the illegal siting and construction of the "Bos Traditions Dairy." The Livestock Management Facilities Act (LMFA), the supposed "holy grail" of regulations concerning building of large CAFO-type facilities, is an outdated document that might have had good intentions in the 1990s, but is never followed when it comes to protecting the environment from these large factory farms. Only minimal criteria are ever met and the CAFOs are still sited.

With that being said, the Illinois EPA is the only protection from huge amounts of waste that always lead to ground or surface water pollution.
