MS. GLOSSER: We will now allow members of the public to address the Board concerning items that appear on today's agenda. If you wish to speak, please state your name and who you represent for the record.

We ask that your -- you keep your remarks brief and I understand we have at least one person wishing to speak today. Michael Jacobson, if you would like to, I guess, stand up. We don't have a podium today, but if you can stand up and speak.

MR. JACOBSON: Ladies and gentlemen of the Board, my name is Michael Jacobson on behalf of the respondent Indian Creek Development Company in Case Number 14-81, BNSF Railway versus Indian Creek Development Company.

I just want to say a few remarks regarding the respondent's pending motion to dismiss the complainant's complaint as frivolous. This case arises out of a 1993 train collision that occurred on the complainant's property that the train is — the train tracks, I'm sorry, were owned and operated by the complainant and as part of that collision over — between 5,800 and 6,800

gallons of diesel fuel spilled into the ground. It has migrated to the surrounding areas around the complainant's property.

The respondents own property that has been affected by the diesel oil spill. They are a victim of the 1993 train collision and they have been trying to get their property cleaned up for the last 20 years or so.

Now, what the complainant is doing in the case is trying to get an allocation against the victim here and what I mean by that is they're trying to use different statutes and regulations as a basis for leave for which they don't have any basis for any relief in that regard. In their complaint, they cite Section 22.2(d) Subpart F as a basis for their contribution for Indian Creek to be allocated some of the responsibilities for this action and I'll tell you also that in 1996 there was a judicial consent order entered into between the IEPA and the BNSF Railway Company.

That consent order required BNSF to clean up only its contamination on the surrounding areas that had been affected by the

1993 train collision. As it stands, BNSF is only obligated to clean up its own contamination.

Section 22.2(d) Subpart F is a basis for allocation liability if there is an order from the director of the IEPA or consent order from the director of the IEPA issuing a responsive action.

The consent order entered into

. 2

by the IEPA and BNSF is not a Section 22.2(d) response action. It is completely separate. They don't really have any basis for relief under 22.2(d). Regardless, this, again, is not an action where there can be any allocation of responsibility because BNSF is the only party that is responsible to clean up its own contamination.

Additionally, and for the first time, in its response to the respondent's motion to dismiss the complainant's cite to section -- regulation, sorry, 35 Ill. Adm. Code 741 as an alternative basis for allocation liability.

Again, this section is also a frivolous attempt to allocate liability here because this section stems from 415 ILCS 58.9, which requires that two parties be jointly responsible for such contamination for there to be

some sort of contribution or allocation liability and in the same regard BNSF is the only party that is responsible for any sort of contamination, remediation and investigative action. There is no joint responsibility on behalf of the respondents in this action. Thank you.

MS. GLOSSER: Thank you very much. Is there anyone else that wishes to speak today? Seeing none, this concludes the time the Board has set aside to allow the public to address the Board. We will now proceed with the items on our agenda.
