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COMPLAINANT'S RESPONSE TO RESPONDENT'S DEMAND FOR A BILL OF PARTICULARS

Complainant JOHNS MANVILLE ("JM") hereby responds to Respondent ILLINOIS DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION'S ("IDOT") Demand for a Bill of Particulars as follows:

- 1. On July 15, 2014, Respondent filed a Demand for a Bill of Particulars in this case with respect to Paragraphs 33 and 34 of Complainant's Amended Complaint, in which JM referenced "IDOT engineering drawings" as support for its allegations that IDOT used asbestoscontaining material ("ACM") as fill and otherwise used, spread and/or buried ACM during construction of the Greenwood Avenue embankments and during construction and/or obliteration of Bypasses A and B.
- 2. Complainant objects to Respondent's Demand because Respondent makes no attempt to explain why it is entitled to a Bill of Particulars under these circumstances. Even assuming a bill of particulars is available in an action before the Illinois Pollution Control Board, the Illinois Code of Civil Procedure only entitles one to such a bill if the allegations are "so

wanting in details that the responding party should be entitled to a bill of particulars." 735 ILCS

5/2-607(a)(2012). The only justification proffered by Respondent is that the allegations are

vague and lacking in detail; however, no attempt is made to explain why that is so.

3. Additionally, Complainant objects to Respondent's Demand because it fails to

comply with 735 ILCS 5/2-607 in that it does not "point out specifically the defects complained

of or the details desired." 735 ILCS 5/2-607(a)(emphasis added). Rather, Respondent contends

that it is "unable to determine what 'IDOT engineering drawings' Johns Manville is referring to

in Paragraphs 33 and 34 of its Amended Complaint." This is essentially a discovery request. JM

cannot provide substantial "additional detail" regarding these drawings without ultimately

providing Respondent copies of the requested documents. Despite numerous attempts by

Complainant to set a discovery schedule, virtually no discovery has been conducted to date.

Respondent's discovery request is premature because discovery has not yet begun in this case.

4. Subject to and without waiving the foregoing objections, Complainant states that

the referenced drawings generally consist of the plans for the proposed highway at F.A. Route

437 – Section 8-HB & 8-VB Lake County, which are included as Exhibit I to IDOT's CERCLA

Section 104(e) Response.
