Re: Support for Midwest Generation's Requested Variance, Docket No. PCB 13-24

Dear Mr. Therriault:

I would like to be on record with the Illinois Pollution Control Board as strongly supporting Midwest Generation's request for short-term relief from state regulations governing emissions at its coal-fired power plants.

Midwest Generation is a company that conducts itself with a great deal of integrity and responsibility to stakeholders, including employees, policymakers and local communities. Its request for a variance is straightforward and reasonable.

All it seeks is permission to invest less than it otherwise would have during just two years of the State's 12-year emissions reductions program. The company is not looking to duck its responsibilities; it merely wants to defer some capital expenses for environmental improvements as it goes through a financial restructuring.

Even if granted the variance, Midwest Generation would still hit the state-mandated emissions targets by the end of the program in 2019. And, its emissions from 2013-16 would be less than projected when current state regulations were adopted in 2007. In other words, the request would result in lower emissions than currently required.

Midwest Generation contributes a great deal to the Illinois economy and to the Pekin area economy. In Illinois it provides 850 jobs for its employees (65 percent union) and hundreds more for building and construction trade union members hired for special projects in the plants. It purchases hundreds of millions of dollars of goods and services from Illinois companies. It pays nearly \$5 million in property taxes to support local schools and municipal services. I can speak from personal experience and knowledge that Midwest Generation has been a good corporate citizen in the Pekin area, through involvement in community, civic and charitable organizations.

Finally, there is an issue of fundamental fairness. Just last September, the Pollution Control Board granted Ameren a variance that was similar in many respects to what Midwest Generation seeks. In fact, the major difference is that Midwest Generation's request is more limited in scope than Ameren's.

I respectfully request that the Board approve Midwest Generation's request.
