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CHAIRMAN KEENAN: We call to order the 1 2 November 5, 2015 meeting of the Illinois Pollution 3 Control Board. So if you wouldn't mind, if you could speak in the direction of the court reporter and start off by stating your -- your name, your organizational affiliation, and then speak -- speak -- then speak distinctly, which I can't do, so that everybody can hear your -- your comments and that we get everything down verbatim as -- as you would like it.

Sierra Club, and on -- and I -- I want to speak to rule making R1410.

On September 15th the Sierra Club Clean Rivers Network and the Environmental Law Policy Center filed an amended proposal and a motion to reopen rule making R1410 which deals with coal combustion waste, ash ponds and surface impoundments at power generating facilities.

So I'm here today with Katrina Phillips (phonetic) who is the Sierra Club's clean water and conservation advocate, and Jack Darren (phonetic) who is Director of the Illinois Sierra Club. And on behalf of the Sierra Club Clean Rivers Network and ALPC and the citizens of Illinois that we represent, and the nearly thousand individuals who submitted comments recently on this rule making, I'm here to respectively (sic) request that the Board deny Illinois EPA's motion for an indefinite stay and grant the environmental group's motion to reopen the docket.

Illinois EPA opened this proceeding in 2013 to, quote, "fill a regulatory gap in the Board's rules governing coal combustion waste surface impoundments," unquote. Noting that the Board's regulations, quote, "do not provide a method for

closure or corrective action at these facilities," unquote.

Although new federal rules have been adopted, there are several important reasons to adopt state rules in the matter as soon as possible.

First, the federal coal ash rule does not address compliance with Illinois' ground water resurface water quality standards.

Second, the federal rule does not apply to impoundments associated with generating stations that are no longer operating. And we have facilities like Maridocia (phonetic) and Vermilion that are no longer operating. We just heard recently that the IGE plans to close their Wood River facility.

Third, the state rule is an important opportunity to -- opportunity to include financial assurances as recommended by the Illinois Attorney General's Office to ensure that the state isn't left to cover clean up and closure costs.

Fourth, the state rule establishes a process for agency oversight and public participation that is absent from the self-implementing federal rules.

So definitely a regulatory gap remains

and the environmental group's September 15th proposal was an attempt to harmonize the good work we all have done on the draft state rules with the new federal rule.

So reopening the procedures and directing this docket to proceed is consistent with the goal of restoring, protecting and enhancing the quality of our environment and is the path that the Board should take. So we look forward to the Board's discussion today on that rule making. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN KEENAN: Thank you.

Is there anyone else who would like to make a statement? Anyone in Springfield?

MEMBER IN SPRINGFIELD: Nobody here.

CHAIRMAN KEENAN: Okay.
