Board Sends to First Notice a Proposal to Adopt Air Pollution Regulations to Control Volatile Organic Material Emissions from Certain Products in Ozone Nonattainment Areas

On January 7, 2010, the Illinois Pollution Control Board adopted for first-notice a proposal to adopt air pollution regulations docketed as <u>In the Matter of: Reasonably</u> <u>Available Control Technology (RACT) for Volatile Organic Material Emissions from</u> <u>Group II Consumer & Commercial Products: Proposed Amendments to 35 Ill. Adm.</u> <u>Code 211, 218, and 219 (R10-08)</u>. The proposed regulations would control emissions of volatile organic material (VOM) for Group II Consumer & Commercial Products in ozone nonattainment areas classified as moderate and above. Group II Consumer & Commercial Products include industrial cleaning solvents, flat wood paneling coatings, flexible packaging printing materials, lithographic printing materials and letter press printing materials. The first-notice proposal includes changes reflected in two IEPA motions to amend granted by the Board. Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) filed the proposal on July 9, 2009.</u>

The IEPA states that this proposal is intended to satisfy Illinois' obligation under the Clean Air Act to submit a State Implementation Plan (SIP) addressing VOM emissions in areas designated as nonattainment for the National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS). Specifically the IEPA states that Illinois must revise its SIP to include RACT for sources of VOM emissions covered by a United States Environmental Protection Agency control techniques guideline (CTG), which USEPA finalized in October 2006. USEPA required submission of SIP revisions responding to the CTGs within one year. IEPA states that Illinois is required to submit these SIP revisions before the USEPA can redesignate the Chicago and Metro East nonattainment area as attaining the 1997 ozone NAAQS, regardless of whether the VOM reductions obtained by the SIP revisions are actually necessary to achieve attainment of the NAAQS.

Chicago and St. Louis/Metro East areas in Illinois have been designated as moderate nonattainment areas for the 8-hour ozone standard. VOM is characterized by the IEPA as "a primary precursor to the formation of ground-level ozone."

Publication of these proposed amendments in the *Illinois Register* will begin a 45-day public comment period, during which anyone may file a public comment with the Board. The Board encourages persons to file public comments on these proposed amendments. The docket number for this rulemaking, R10-08, should be indicated on the public comment.
