The Board has the authority pursuant to Section 35 of the Act [415 ILCS 5/35] and 35 Ill. Adm. Code 104 to grant a variance. IPH, Medina Valley, and AER request a variance from the sulfur dioxide ("SO2") emission rate provisions of the Illinois Multi-Pollutant Standard, 35 Ill. Adm. Code 225.233, specifically the SO2 emission standards set forth in Section 225.233(e)(3)(C)(ii) and (v), with respect to the Coffeen Energy Center (134 CIPS Lane, Coffeen, Illinois, Montgomery County), Duck Creek Energy Center (17751 North CILCO Road, Canton, Illinois, Fulton County), E.D. Edwards Energy Center (7800 South CILCO Lane, Bartonville, Illinois, Peoria County), Joppa Energy Center (2100 Portland Road, Joppa, Illinois, Massac County), Hutsonville Energy Center (15142 East 1900th Ave., Hutsonville, Illinois, Crawford County), Meredith Energy Center (800 South Washington Street, Meredith, Illinois, Morgan County), and Newtown Energy Center (6125 North 500th Street, Newton, Illinois, Jasper County). IPH, Medina Valley, and AER seek relief from Section 225.233(e)(3)(C)(ii) for the period from January 1, 2015, through December 31, 2019, and relief from Section 225.233(e)(3)(C)(v) for the period from January 1, 2017, through December 31, 2019. A copy of this variance petition may be obtained through the Clerk's Office of the Board. The Board's office address is Illinois Pollution Control Board, James R. Thompson Center, 100 West Randolph Street, Suite 11-500, Chicago, Illinois 60601 (telephone: 312-814-3620).

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency ("Illinois EPA") solicits the views of persons who may be affected by the variance. The Illinois EPA is preparing a recommendation, and, unless otherwise ordered by the hearing officer or Board, plans to file the recommendation on or before September 5, 2013. The record will remain open for written comments for 45 days after the filing of the recommendation and should be submitted to the Board at the address specified above. The record is available at the Board office for inspection, except those portions that are protected from disclosure under 35 Ill. Adm. Code 130. Procedures are available whereby disclosure may be sought by the public.

A hearing may be held after the filing of the recommendation. However, if a written objection to the variance and a request for hearing are received by the Board office, no later than twenty-one (21) days from the publication of this Notice, the Board must conduct a hearing on the petition.

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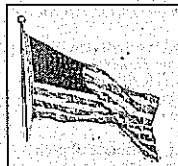
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Caterpillar 2Q profit falls 43 pct; cuts outlook

AP — A global mining industry slump cut into second-quarter earnings at Caterpillar Inc. as companies spent less on equipment and dealers cut inventories more than Caterpillar expected.

The world's largest maker of construction and mining equipment posted a 43 percent slide in earnings and cut its profit and revenue outlook for the year.

Caterpillar reported earnings of \$960 million, or \$1.45 per share, compared with \$1.7 billion, or \$2.54 per share a year ago. Revenue slid 15.8 percent to \$14.63 billion.

That was well short of Wall Street's expectations. Analysis surveyed by FactSet had expected a profit of \$1.69 per share on revenue of \$15.09 billion.

The company said dealers cut inventories by \$1 billion as the global mining industry slowed. Growth especially slowed in China.

Shares of Caterpillar Inc. fell \$2.06, or 2.4 percent, to \$83.46 in afternoon trading.

Caterpillar also said it had currency translation and hedging losses during the quarter.

Doug Oberhelman predicted improved profits during the second half of the year as the company takes further cost-cutting measures.

Caterpillar still cut its full-year profit outlook from about \$7 per share to \$6.50. And revenue is now expected to come in between \$56 billion and \$58 billion, down from previous guidance of \$57 billion to \$61 billion.

Dealers, Oberhelman said, used inventory from Caterpillar's product distribution during the quarter rather than stocking their own businesses. Company inventory also dropped by \$1.2 billion.

Dealers are positioned to cut inventory even further, and the company expects it to fall by \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion in the second half, Oberhelman said.

"That means we are underselling end-user demand this year, and it sets us up for better sales in 2014," he said.

Caterpillar, which has seen its share price decline 7 percent this year, repurchased \$1 billion worth of stock in the second quarter, and based on strong cash flow, it expects to buy another \$1 billion worth in the third quarter.

On a conference call, Mike DeWalt, the company's controller and investor relations chief, coaxed that production and profit margins won't pick up until mining companies begin ordering more equipment from dealers, who will then restock inventories.

"I think that's certainly having some impact on the dealer order rates to us," he said.

"Certainly until we get through the inventory reduction, that will probably be a drag at least on orders placed on us," he said.

Oberhelman said the company already has temporarily closed factories and had rolling layoffs. "We've taken significant action already, and we will be taking additional cost reduction measures in the second half of 2013," he said.

Caterpillar cut its global full-time workforce by more than 10,000 people compared with the second quarter of last year. The company had 122,402 employees at the end of June. The temporary workforce also dropped by 9,633 during the quarter.

Profits fell in each of Caterpillar's big divisions. Operating profit fell 61 percent to \$550 million in resource industries, which includes mining. It was down 47 percent to \$362 million for construction equipment, and down 3 percent to \$955 million in power systems, which makes items including large electrical generators and locomotive engines.

A 9 percent drop in Caterpillar's construction revenue came despite the improvements in the U.S. housing market. But North America is less than half of Caterpillar's construction revenue.

Senate passes student loan rates bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Borrowing for tuition, housing and books would be less expensive for college students and their parents this fall but the costs could soon start climbing under a bill the Senate passed overwhelmingly Wednesday.

The bipartisan proposal would link interest rates on federal student loans to the financial markets, providing lower interest rates right away but higher ones later if the economy improves as expected. The measure was similar to one that already had passed the Republican-led House and leaders from both chambers said they predicted the differences in it would be resolved before students start signing loan documents for the fall term.

"This compromise is a major victory for our nation's students," President Barack Obama said in a statement.

Undergraduates this fall would borrow at a 3.9 percent interest rate. Graduate students would have access to loans at 5.4 percent, and parents would borrow at 6.1 percent. The rates would be locked in for that year's loan, but each year's loan could be more expensive than the last. Rates would rise as the economy picks up and it becomes more expensive for the government to borrow money.

Liberal members of the Democratic caucus were vocal in their opposition over the potentially shifting rates included in the Senate measure, which passed with support from both parties, 81-18. The bill passed with support from 45 Republicans, 35 Democrats and Sen. Angus King, the independent from Maine who helped negotiate the deal.

Sen. Mike Lee, R-Utah, joined 16 Democrats and Sen. Bernie Sanders, the Vermont independent who caucuses with Democrats, to oppose the legislation.

Sen. Claire McCaskill, D-Mo., did not cast a recorded vote.

"This permanent, market-based plan makes students' loans cheaper, simpler and more certain," said Sen. Lamar Alexander, the top Republican on the Senate education panel. "It ends the annual game of Congress playing politics with student loan interest rates at the expense of students planning their futures."

35 Democrats and Sen. Angus King, the independent from Maine who helped negotiate the deal.

Sen. Mike Lee, R-Utah, joined 16 Democrats and Sen. Bernie Sanders, the Vermont independent who caucuses with Democrats, to oppose the legislation.

Sen. Claire McCaskill, D-Mo., did not cast a recorded vote. "This permanent, market-based plan makes students' loans cheaper, simpler and more certain," said Sen. Lamar Alexander, the top Republican on the Senate education panel. "It ends the annual game of Congress playing politics with student loan interest rates at the expense of students planning their futures."

Rates on new subsidized Stafford loans doubled to 6.8 percent July 1 because Congress could not agree on a way to keep them at 3.4 percent. Without congressional action, rates would stay at 6.8 percent — a reality most lawmakers called unacceptable, although deep differences emerged even among allies as to how to remedy it. The compromise that came together during the last few weeks would be a good deal for all students through the 2015 academic year. After that, interest rates are expected to climb above where they were when students left campus in the spring, if congressional estimates prove correct.

"That's the same thing credit card companies said when they sold zero-interest rate credit cards. ... The bill comes due," said Sen. Elizabeth Warren, D-Mass. "All students will end up paying far higher interest rates on their loans than they do now."

The announcement Wednesday that Prince William and his wife, Kate, had selected a monitor steeped in British history came as royal officials said the new parents were seeking quiet family time away from the flashbulbs and frenzy that accompanied the birth of their first child.

While the newsmen put to rest intense speculation over what name the couple would choose, the extreme interest around it illustrated how the 3-day-old future heir is already on his way to a lifetime of fanfare and public glare.

Kensington Palace said William and Kate were "delighted to announce their son's name, adding that the baby will be known as "His Royal Highness Prince George of Cambridge."

The name George — borne by six kings

— befits the boy now third in line to the British throne and was a favorite among British bookmakers, evoking the steadfastness of the queen's father, George VI, who rallied the nation during World War II.

Alexander is a name shared by three medieval Scottish kings, and Louis could be a tribute to Lord Louis Mountbatten, uncle to the queen's husband, Prince Philip, and the last British viceroy of India before it gained independence in 1947. William's father, Prince Charles, was close to Mountbatten, who was assassinated by the Irish Republican Army in 1979.

The announcement of the name, just two days after the baby's birth, was quick by royal standards. Queen Elizabeth II and Philip took a month before settling on the name Charles for the Prince of Wales. Charles and Princess Diana took a week before settling on William's four names.

of the National Park Service. The study is the next step in the process of becoming part of the National Park Service, which would ensure long-term preservation and public use of the historical area.

New Philadelphia was the first town founded by a free African-American in 1836. Frank McWorter purchased his freedom, as well as freedom for his wife and several other family members. He settled in New Philadelphia, which became a stop along the Underground Railroad. The historic town site was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2005 and, in 2009, achieved elite status as National Historic Landmark — the federal govern-

ment's highest recognition of a cultural resource.

Charlotte King, director of the New Philadelphia Association, also testified in support of the Schock legislation. Senators Richard Durbin and Mark Kirk have introduced companion legislation in the U.S. Senate.

"I'm happy to report that my bill has bipartisan support from members not just in Illinois or the Midwest ... but from across our country," Schock said. "New Philadelphia illustrates one of the best parts of the American story — self-determination. A black man from a slave state was able to purchase his own freedom, relocate his family ... and not only start a new life, but also found an entire town so that others might have similar opportunity."

The site was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2005 and was designated a National Historic Landmark in 2009.

Robbery suspect acts as own lawyer

Champaign man accused of May 2012 heist at Central Illinois Bank

PEORIA — A Champaign man accused of bank robbery chose to represent himself during trial proceedings Wednesday afternoon.
Neil Meyer D. Anderson, 32, acted as his own lawyer during the two-hour bench trial. Assistant state attorney David Cast called 10 witnesses and presented 19 exhibits of evidence related to the May 5, 2012, robbery of Central Illinois Bank.

Anderson cross-examined witnesses, often asking them to identify the moment they saw the robber's face on surveillance tapes or to describe identifying features, but did not call any witnesses on his behalf.
The case was continued on multiple occasions before the bench trial began in front of circuit judge Keith Lyons.
"Look, motion after motion," Lyons said, thumbing a thick stack of court documents after Anderson requested the judge order a continuance. "That's what we should do here, is address concerns of defendants and witnesses, but enough is enough."
Four bank employees testified at the trial, each identifying Anderson as the man who entered the Sheridan Village facility more than a year ago and handed a teller a note reading, "I have a gun. So does my friend. Give me all your loose bills or everybody dies."
That note, nearly \$1,000 in cash and the clothes Anderson was wearing at the time of his arrest were among the items submitted as evidence.
Four Peoria police officers also took the stand. Each was involved either in Anderson's apprehension or the discovery of an unaccepted vehicle tied to the crime.
Anderson was arrested within half an hour of the robbery after an officer spotted him jumping fences and running through backyards in the vicinity.
He had a cellphone in one pocket and cash in the other.
Both the state and defense are expected to make closing arguments Friday before Lyons enters a verdict on the two felony charges.
Anderson faces up to 15 years in prison if convicted of financial institution robbery or aggravated robbery.

Chicago awards \$10M to torture victim

Eric Cairns' conviction in the 1980 slaying of Vincent and Paula Sanchez was largely based on a false confession made after he was physically abused by detectives under former Chicago Police Cmdr. Jon Burge. Burge is serving 30 years in prison for his role in a lawsuit that he'd never witnessed or participated in the torture of suspects.

Hovercraft valuable for rescues

Standard Fire Department was called out twice last weekend to aid boaters

HERBY — Rescues operations involving the Standard Fire Department's hovercraft usually aren't as dramatic as some during the April flooding.
Chief Mike Skowers pointed out that the more common calls for the unit based in a small Putnam County village involve situations in which pleasure boats have gotten stuck in the mud in shallow areas that can't be readily reached by either a boat or a motor vehicle.
And that happened twice over the past weekend, when the craft hovered in to rescue people on two boats stranded in the shallows of Sawmill Creek, an Illinois River backwater stretching from Henry into Putnam County.
"That's a favorite sport to get stuck in," Skowers said. "They don't realize that they're getting stuck when they come up north. They think they're still in the channel."
Early Friday Standard was called by Marshall County authorities for assistance near Henry. The hovercraft is especially useful in such situations because it moves on a cushion of air that lets it slip above the water surface.
"Henry has a boat, so we can go into the shallows and then bring (the boaters) back out to the boat in the

river," Skowers explained.
On Sunday evening, seven people in a larger boat got stuck farther north in the lake. The department was called by Putnam County after one passenger made it to the shore and a homeowner called for help.
"I have never seen people on board, and they only had one cellphone," which apparently could not get through, Skowers said. "That's something you don't see very often either."
The other six were taken by the hovercraft in two trips to shore. They were covered in mud from having gotten out of the boat and tried unsuccessfully to push it, which is a common occurrence, Skowers said.
"They're always glad to get out," he added. "One of the first things they ask

is how much it's going to cost to get the boat out. I don't know that, but I imagine it's going to be huge quantities of money."
No one was injured in either incident, and that's usually the case, Skowers said. There is sometimes a chance of people overboard efforts to push a boat out, much like heart attacks sometimes result from snow-shoveling, he added, and further risk could have come Sunday with the six people left on the boat possibly not knowing whether the other made it to shore.
"That could have been a dangerous situation," Skowers said.


