Re: Public Comment in IPCB R2025-21: Placement of Limestone Residual Materials

Members of the Illinois Pollution Control Board:

I write today to express my strong support for the proposal submitted by the City of Aurora and HolcimUS to establish a regulatory framework for the placement of Lime Residual Materials (LRM) in underground mines. As the State Senator representing Illinois' 42nd District and the City of Aurora, and a sponsor of the legislation mandating the rules included in this proposal, I have long been an advocate for the safe and cost-effective management of this material when that management is accompanied by strong environmental safeguards. I believe we accomplished that in House Bill 3095. While this legislation was adopted in the spring of 2023, my work towards this resolution encompassed many years before it was ultimately signed by the Governor, and I therefore urge the Board to move forward with expeditiously adopting the proposal before it.

Currently, Illinois farmers use LRM on their farm fields to address soil acidity issues. Clearly, if managed appropriately, the material itself does not pose a threat to the environment if it can be applied to land with only modest oversight from the Agency. Further, providing an alternative method for managing LRM beyond land application could free up millions of dollars for the City to put towards other environmental concerns, such as lead service line replacement, emerging contaminant control, or other water treatment needs. The proposed rules before you today reflect not just my commitment, but also the City of Aurora's commitment to sound management of citizen's tax dollars, as well as the safety of the public, sustainable environmental practices, and the innovative use of these materials.
