Application for landfill expansion to be filed in days

By ELENA GRIMM egrimm@daily-chronicle.com SYCAMORE - An application to expand the county landfill should be filed to the county by Nov. 30.

That is the date Waste Management of Illinois Inc. and county officials have marked. Once filed, the application will be available to the public at the DeKalb County Clerk's Office, several municipalities including Cortland and DeKalb, and at area libraries, DeKalb County Administrator Ray Bockman said Friday.

The Pollution Control Facility Committee, an ad-hoc committee of seven county board members and eight support staff, met Friday afternoon to go over the schedule for public hearings and other routine information pertinent to the expansion process.

Public hearings will be held March 1-5, 2010, and will flow into the next week, if needed. Hearings will be held from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. each day, with an evening session scheduled for March 2.

The biggest concern voiced by committee members was choosing a right-sized venue. The Gathertorium of the County Legislative Center has been booked for the hearings.

The county already ran into the problem of not having a large-enough space once, when about 400 people showed up for a public hearing on a wind farm earlier this year in a room built for 250. The hearing was rescheduled and held in a high school gymnasium.

"It overwhelmed us," County Planning Director Paul Miller said.

Renee Cipriano, a former director of the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency who will be providing legal counsel to the county during the landfill expansion process, recommended finding a larger venue if an unexpected crowd should turn up.

But she doesn't think that will happen.

"There really isn't that core, active group that you're aware of," she said. "It really depends on if you have a municipality you know that is going to have issues, they'll try to pack the room, or a community group or environmental group."

The Gathertorium can seat about 100, with overflow space in the lobby using a PA system.

Bockman said he would look into other options.

"Plan B will be critical," said Lee Addleman, a consultant with Waste Management. "Should 300 people show up, they need to be able to hear."

Leading up to the filing date, Waste Management has notified all interested parties, including about 17 adjacent property owners, Addleman said. Patrick Engineering, the firm overseeing the project, is reviewing engineering aspects of the siting application before it's filed with the county.

After the siting application is filed and public hearings take place, the Pollution Control Facility Committee will make a recommendation to the county board, which has ultimate local authority.

Appeals to the board's decision then can occur.

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After local approval, a second application process happens on the state level, where a permit needs to be granted to Waste Management to make the expansion, Bockman said. That process could take two years.

Waste Management wants to expand the DeKalb County Landfill to take in a total of 500,000 tons of solid waste a year, or about 2,000 tons per day. Currently, the landfill receives 300-350 tons of trash a day from the county, and only seven years of capacity remain, officials said.
