



Dow breaks 6-day losing streak

The Dow Jones industrial aver age broke a six-day losing streak Thursday, notching a small gain af-ter the government released better mployment numbers.

Before Thursday, the Dow had fallen six days in a row, its longest losing streak since August.

Investors have worried that job growth is fading. They were cu-couraged by a Labor Department report that applications for unem-playment benefits dropped 1,030 to 367,000 in the week ending May 5.

That pulled the four-week average, which economists watch more closely, down to 379,000 - closer to the 375,000 level, which suggests job growth is strong enough to reduce the unemployment rate. Eight out of 10 industry groups

in the S&P 500 rose, with only ma-terials and technology stocks de-clining. Utilities were the biggest gainers, up 0.9 percent, followed by health cave and consumer staples.

Tech stocks closed down 0.8 percent, and the Nasdaq compos-ite index fell 1.07 points to 2,933.61. Networking gear maker Clsco Systems plunged 10.5 percent after warning that technology spend-ing appears to be slowing and that its revenue would rise much less than analysts expected this quar-are usukes, winder some for can rearr
