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MR. KEENAN: We'll start off by opening the opportunity for public comments at the meeting. At each Board meeting the Board sets aside time for members of the public to provide input on any case on the Board's agenda. We welcome any and all comments and in the interest of fairness we ask that each speaker limit their time to about three minutes.

All of our comments are recorded by the court reporter. So if you can just speak clearly and distinctly, that would be great and please start off by stating and spelling your name, your organizational affiliation and then you can make your statement.

MS. TREACY: Thank you. My name is Terri Treacy, that's T-E-R-R-I, T-R-E-A-C-Y. I'm with the Sierra Club Illinois Chapter and I'm here for R14-10.

On September 15, 2015, Sierra
Club, Prairie Rivers Network, and the
Environmental Law & Policy Center filed an amended
proposal and motion to reopen case R14-10.

I'm here today on behalf of the above mentioned organizations and the citizens of

Illinois that they represent and the nearly 1,000 individuals who submitted comments to respectfully request that the Board, one, deny IEPA's motion for an indefinite stay and, two, grant the Environmental Groups' motion to reopen the docket.

According to IEPA, there are at least 91 coal ash impoundments at 24 operating and closed power plants in Illinois that store wet coal combustion waste. At least 89 of these impoundments are diked surface structures that range in size from less than an acre to over 300 acres. Some of the surface structures are lined with impermeable materials while others are not.

The chemical make-up of coal combustion waste depends on the type of coal used, as well as the combustion technology and pollution control technology used at the facility. CCW can contain; antimony, arsenic, barium, boron, beryllium, cadmium, chromium, chloride, iron, lead, mercury, manganese, nickel, selenium, silver, sulfate, and thallium. The presence of these contaminants threatens groundwater as these contaminants are soluble and mobile. When the CCW surface impoundments are not lined with

impermeable material, these contaminants may leach into the groundwater, affecting the potential use of the groundwater. While some of these contaminants affect safety of drinking water, others affect taste and odor, and other potential uses such as irrigation.

Illinois EPA opened this proceeding in 2013 to fill a regulatory gap in the Board's rules governing coal combustion waste surface impoundments noting that the Board's regulations did not provide a method for closure or corrective action at these facilities. Although new federal rules have been adopted, there are several important reasons to adopt state rules in this matter as soon as possible.

not address compliance with Illinois groundwater or surface water quality standards. This means that the unworkable ad hoc process that brought the Agency to this rulemaking in the first place will persist. In the interest of efficiency, the Board should adopt State Coal Ash Rules as soon as possible to help ensure that when an owner or operator undertakes corrective action

or closure of a coal ash impoundment, it does not risk duplicating either planning efforts or the remediation work itself in order to comply with state groundwater or surface water quality standards.

The federal rule does not apply to impoundments associated with generating stations that are no longer operating. Coal ash impoundments at such facilities, like those at Meredosia and Vermilion affect real Illinois communities, as well as the state's only national scenic river. These rules would establish a procedure for clean-up and closure at those facilities that do not now exist in the state or federal rules.

The state rule is also an important opportunity to include financial assurances, as recommended by the Illinois Attorney General's office, to ensure that the state isn't left to cover cleanup and closure costs.

The state rule establishes a process for agency oversight and public participation that is absent from the self-implementing federal rules. A regulatory gap

remains. The Environmental Groups' September 15, 2015, proposal was an attempt to step in and make up for the Agency's lack of leadership regarding the rulemaking it initiated. IEPA represented to the Board that this state rule was necessary and appropriate despite the fact that a federal rule governing coal combustion waste was simultaneously under development.

Reopening the proceedings and directing this docket to proceed is consistent with the goal of restoring, protecting, and enhancing the quality of our environment and is the path that the Board should take here.

Thank you for allowing me to make these comments today. I appreciate it.
